'A Shot In The Dark' To Ring Out From Barn

The mystery-comedy, "A Shot In The Dark," which will open at The Players Barn on 12 Mile Road on April 28, was adapted by Harry Kurnitz from the French play, "L'Idiot," by Marcel Achard.

Indeed, the young farm girl-turned-parlormaid who is being investigated for the murder of her lover, gives the impression of being an idiot. However, the hero of the piece, the young magistrate going the investigation, strives to see that justice is done! It sounds a little melodramatic, but the exposure of the evidence is both thought-provoking and hilarious.

Norel McNeely plays the young magistrate, Paul Sevigne, and Marian Wood is seen as Josepha, the parlormaid. Others involved in the affair are Benjamin and Dominique Beaurevers who employ Josepha played by Stuart Orman and Kathryn Kornmesser; Antoinette Sevigne, wife of the young magistrate, played by Peggy Sisto; the clerk, Morestan played by Dennis Broadhead; the chief prosecutor, L'Abbe, Ed Risk; and the guard will be Hilmer Howard.

Residents of this area will have the opportunity to visit the Michigan Historical Commission's mobile museum Saturday and Sunday, April 22 and April 23, on the premises of Northville State Hospital, on Seven Mile Road about a mile and a half east of the City of Northville.


The 10 by 54 foot Historymobile will be located adjacent to the hospital's Activity Therapy Building, at the western end of the hospital's property. It will be open from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Members of local historical societies will serve as monitors. There is no admission charge.

Displays in the mobile museums are arranged chronologically. They cover such topics as prehistoric man in Michigan, French exploration, and the fur trade, the British era, the American territorial period and statehood, immigration, development of mineral resources, transportation, the Civil War, lumbering, and agriculture.

Other exhibits feature early Michigan industries, the auto industry, Michigan in World War I, the Twenties, the Depression, and the developments since the end of World War II.


