Timely Tips on GARDENING

Trees have been cherished since time immemorial. In ancient times when vast forest tracts covered most of Europe and much of North America, it was only natural that trees be worshipped and regarded as sacred. Tree worship in one aspect or another was a facet of most early religions. In fact, the words "temple" and "sanctuary" stem from ancient words meaning grove or woodland glade.

Now the primeval forests are gone, their splendor represented only by shrinking remnants, and we no longer regard trees as inhabited by animate spirits. Although the emphasis has shifted, modern man still cherishes trees and celebrates tree planting festivals. Arbor Day is such a celebration.

Arbor Day is of purely American origin and was first observed in 1872 in Nebraska. Gradually its observance spread throughout the United States and into Canada, and now many other countries have similar observances. The ceremonies generally center around the planting of trees by school children; however, the scope is being broadened

in many places to include the preservation and appreciation of other natural resources in addition to trees.

Arbor Day is celebrated on different dates in different localities depending on the best time for tree planting. It is in early Spring in the South and near summer in the northern states. Some states have a fall date.

Michigan has set aside a week for the observance, rather than limit it to a single day. April 23 through 29 has been designated "Arbor Week" for this year. It is an excellent time to plant trees, not only on public sites, but in your own yard as well.

Select the planting place with care. Do not choose it at random, but place the tree so it will be part of the basic planting design and will contribute to the total landscaping around the home and not look like a misplaced afterthought.

Choose the right tree for the spot where it is to be planted. Some trees grow into large shade trees that are suitable only for spacious grounds or around public buildings. Smaller trees will look better with smaller sized trees.

Michigan State University has published a list of desirable trees. Among the recommended large shade trees are: Moraine locust and other non-thorny honey locusts; sugar and Norway maples; red, white, and pin oaks; hickory; American ash and sycamore. For medium sized trees they suggest mountain ash, ginkgo, magnolia, and white birch. Among the desirable small trees listed are: golden rain, Japanese cherries, crab apples, redbud, hawthorn, fringe tree, dogwood, and amelanchier.

Professor Cox, who prepared the list, cautions against planting trees known to have weak branching roots that may clog drain pipes, that produce an over abundance of seeds, or have pest and disease problems. Those that he specifically cautions against are: poplar, box elder, tree of heaven, soft maple, mulberry, Siberian (Chinese) elm, willows, and eastern red cedar.

REMEMBERS

Plant trees and shrubs... Thin-barked trees such as birch, dogwood, magnolia and fruit trees should be planted only in spring... Plant peas, radishes and other hardy vegetables... Start seeds of tender annuals and vegetables indoors on a sunny window sill.
