

Summer Driver Education Registration April 29, May 6

Farmington Public Schools will again offer summer driver education to residents of the school district from June 19 to Aug. 4.

Participating students must be at least 15 1/2 years of age. Older students will be given priority.

Students will attend a one-hour class each day, and will drive approximately two days a week. Faithful attendance is necessary to fulfill local and state requirements.

Registration for the 1967 Driver Education Summer Session will take place at the

Farmington Board of Education Building, 2525 Shawanago St., on Saturday, April 29, from 8 a.m.-12 noon and Saturday, May 6, from 8 a.m.-12 noon.

All students who plan to attend the session should plan to register at the above times. Parents may register for students unable to be present.

Non-public school students should present their birth certificates at the time of registration. There is no tuition charge for this program other than a textbook fee.

Jaycee Auxiliary Repeats Free Babysitting Clinic

The Farmington Jaycee Auxiliary is again offering a Free Babysitting Clinic, entitled, "Parents By The Hour."

This clinic is to train girls and boys from junior high age and up to be well qualified babysitters. The auxiliary offers the clinic again because of popularity and because the need for such qualified babysitters increases each year.

Farmington Takes Note Of Nat'l. Library Week

Library week (April 16 to 22) assumes particular importance locally this year because the Farmington District Library Board has initiated a program to give increased library service to the community.

On May 22, Farmington Township voters will vote on a one mill increase for this purpose.

The proceeds of the proposed levy will be used for the construction and equipping of an adequate library facility upon the site now owned by the Farmington City and Township district library on the south side of 12 Mile Rd. between Farmington and Orchard Lake roads and for other capital improvements and operation expenses of the Farmington City and Township District Libraries.

To dramatize the importance of reading and library development, the 10th anniversary week of the National Library Week program will be observed April 16 to 22.

"Explore Inner Space" - Reading and "Reading Is What's Happening" are the dual themes for the 1967 program, sponsored nationally by the National Book Committee, a nonprofit educational society of citizens, in cooperation with the American Library Association.

The annual "week", observed in all fifty states, is traditionally held in the Spring, culminating a year's activity planned and carried out by local and state leaders drawn from the community and the library profession.

In Michigan, the program is sponsored by the 2000-member Michigan Library Association, whose president is Richard E. Chapin, Director of Libraries at Michigan State University. State Chairman coordinating the week activities is Dr. Ira Polley, State Superintendent of Public Instruction.

Within the framework of the over-all effort being about "better, better-informed America," two specific areas are being emphasized during the coming program-year: the recruitment, education and effective placement of professional librarians to help offset critical staff shortages in the nation's libraries; and the concept of total community access to a variety of reading resources, for information as well as enjoyment.

Board To Make Decision On Industrial Rezoning

Farmington Township Board members will face an industrial rezoning decision at their Monday night meeting.

The Planning Commission has proposed that four lots on Middlebelt Road north of 10 Mile be changed from light industrial to RA-1 (residential). The owners don't like the idea.

The case was argued at the April 9 board meeting. Board members deferred action until a meeting to be held on Monday night.

THE LOTS in question are 52, 53, 56 and 77 of Supervisors Flat No. 2. They are located across from Middlebelt Elementary School.

Northwest Pattern Co., the board was told by an attorney, is moving to the Farmington Township in the Farmington location. If the zoning is changed, the firm would be a non-conforming use and would be severely limited if it wanted to expand.

D'Angelo Brothers Excavating Co., whose building burned some months ago, plans to rebuild and use the space for storage and repair of equipment.

An attorney for their firm argued that the lots should have been rezoned years ago, if they were to be in something besides an industrial zone, and added, that the industrial use of the area predated any residential development.

AS IT STANDS, according to Township Attorney S. P. Brennan, the light industrial classification constitutes "a spot zoning" - a classic case in the law.

"Spot" zoning isn't really zoning at all. It exists where a small parcel of property is rezoned in a zoning classification. True zoning contemplates districts, rather than a few lots, designated for a certain usage.

When the owners suggested that the lots be placed-included in a business zone, Brennan replied that it would still be "spot" zoning.
