FARMINGTON'S 1913 RECORD

In Number of Houses Built and
in Other Improvements This
Was a Banner Year

The contention of this paper that a brighter future was in store for Farmington, and that all that was needed was a little more faith on the part of the residents of the town, coupled with the necessary push and enterprise, to make the place grow, seems to be borne out by the progress that has been made this year.

The town has had, not a phenomenal, but a mighty good, healthful growth the past summer. It is probably the best advance in its history, both in building and in valuation.

The installation of electric light service and of the water plant during the past few months were but steps in the building of a new and larger village.

These were followed by the platting of new subdivisions by F. M. Warner and this activity has spurred others into action until new dwelling houses are springing up all over town and the place has the appearance of the lively growing village, which it has become.

Among the many new residences are those built by Oscar Smith, John Clark, Joseph Voigt and Jas. L. Hogle, while others are under construction by F. M. Warner, Amos Otis, John Schroder, W. F. Payne and R. Langbecker, while Charles Ely is about ready to start one. In addition the Selby house, which was recently purchased by John Ingersoll, and others have been remodelled and many improvements made about town.

Besides this work long stretches of cement walk have been laid and miles of streets gravelled and improved.

The town is under motion and only requires a little effort on the part of the people to keep it going.

Farmington played ball as scheduled on those dates winning from Redford Wednesday giving them the privilege of playing Friday.

Mr. and Mrs. Allyn were visiting in Canada at the time and relatives who were staying with the children had not noticed little Jack's absence. The child crept out through the high grass and crawled on the track directly in front of the oncoming car, which was so close the motorman had not time to stop it. The fender struck the child in the face fracturing the jaw bone.

Fortunately the machinery beneath the car was high from the track for the entire length of the car passed over the little fellow without further injuring him.

The child was immediately taken to a hospital in Detroit and his parents notified. Wm. Irish was motorman and Lewis Thayer conductor.
