WILLIAM DOHANY

One of the Oldest and a Highly Respected Pioneer Buried Last Saturday

William Dohany passed away at his farm home Thursday forenoon after only a brief illness. He was stricken the day previous with such symptoms that the family was alarmed and the absent members were summoned. His condition remained unchanged throughout the night and the next morning, but during the forenoon gradually grew worse until the end came at eleven o'clock.

The funeral, which was held at St. Mary's church on Saturday, was very largely attended, two D. U. R. funeral cars being used to convey the large number of friends from the home to the church and from there to the St. Mary's cemetery at Redford where the body was laid at rest.

Father Doolin, with the assistance of two others from Detroit, conducted the services, while the arrangements were in charge of R. B. Northrop, the Redford funeral director.

Mr. Dohany was said to be the oldest native born citizen in this community at the time of his death and was born 75 years ago on the farm in Farmington township owned by his father, who was one of very early pioneers of this section, having first settled here in the early '30s.

Nine children survive beside the devoted wife. They are Dr. John S., Principal Emmet E., William D., Frank H. and Charles E., attorneys, all of Detroit; Casper G. and J. A. of Redford and Farmington; Mrs. John Lapham of Farmington and Mrs. T. Dohany of Chicago.

Mr. Dohany was one of the older residents of this section and was well known. He was a man of strict integrity and was highly esteemed by the whole community.
