Oakland Flag Is Student's Pride

A group of Oakland University students will take particular pride in the flag dedication ceremony.

Chancellor D. B. Varner, Joe Kavanaugh, Detroit; Sandy Richards, Birmingham; and the president and vice president of the Commuter Council participated in the flag raising dedication of the University's newly installed flagpole, last Friday.

The need for a flagpole on the OU campus had been recognized for some time and last year the Commuter Council took the leadership in getting one installed. A check with suppliers soon made it clear to the student group that an adequate installation was too expensive for their budget. The Commuter Council turned to the community to see if they could get the parts contributed. And met with success—local firms willing to contribute pipe, rope, and cement.

The University administrators were so impressed with the enthusiasm and effort on the part of students that funds were identified to install a larger, professionally done pole. The pole and fittings were ordered his summer and permanently installed last week.

Sandy Richards, who had been a leader in the flag project indicated, "We could have had one up a few months sooner, but it would not have been as beautiful. We are proud of it."

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Berger Wants GOP To Discuss Issues

Harris Berger, Democratic candidate for Supervisor of Farmington Township, issued a statement Monday asking why the incumbent Republican officials refused to discuss the issues not only with their opponents, but with the people.

In his statement Berger referred to last week's blast from the GOP Director Thomas S. McMillan directed against the Dems candidate for Supervisor Aldo Vagnozzi, who also happens to be the editor of the Michigan AFL-CIO Newspaper.

Berger asserted, "After weeks of silence, the present Township administration seems to have a spokesman. Unfortunately, however, the statement issued by Republican Director Thomas S. McMillan is hardly the work of a moderate, thoughtful citizen of this community."

"Instead, it is the most reprehensible kind of personal attack that uses the technique of guilt-by-association and innuendo. The Democratic candidates, Aldo Vagnozzi, Betty O'Connor, Joyce Hungerford, Harris Berger and Harold Schipke, started this campaign with the pledge

that we would make no personal attacks on any opposition candidate. We will honor that pledge.

"At the same time," Berger continued, "we will continue to point out that we are in full agreement with the pleas of the press, radio, television and many voter advisory groups that the voters should inform themselves regarding the candidates and the issues."

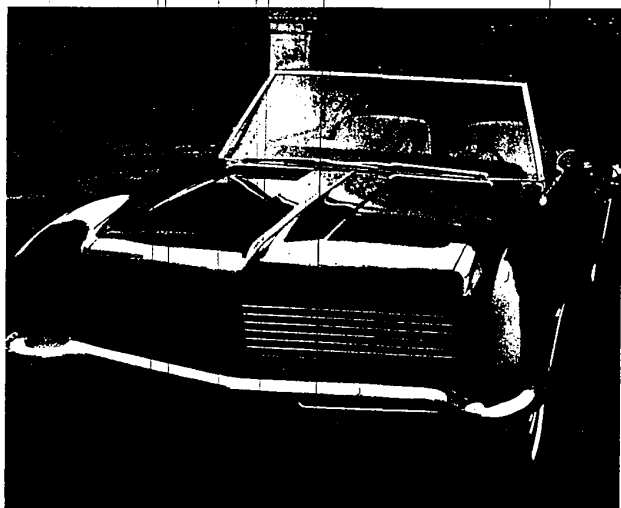
"We solicit support on the basis of the program for improved government that we have been presenting through regularly published news releases."

"We welcome any and all questions, comments and suggestions."

"We are willing to meet with the opposition candidly."

Berger observed, "Our position is that people can't know the kind of government they are going to get from the present administration unless our officials speak out on their program for the next two years regarding taxes, incorporation, zoning, safety, public health, property assessments, recreation, trash collection and anything else that is clearly within the scope of their responsibility."

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
