\$34,000,000 Program

Road Improvements

The Roads and Bridges Committee of the Wayne County Board of Supervisors has approved a \$34 million highway program submitted by the Wayne County Road Commission.

Al Barbour, chairman of the Road Commission, said construction phases of the program, budgeted for 1966-67, emphasize access routes to the freeway system.

Barbour listed major construction projects for the year and cost:

- Reconstruction of Pennsylvania Road from North Line Road to Pennsylvania Road—\$148,750
- Reconstruction in Redford Township of Beech-Daily Road from Grand River to Base Line Road into five-lane reinforced concrete—\$602,580.
- Reconstruction in Livonia of Haggerty Road from M-14 to Joy Road; two-lane reinforced concrete—\$428,290.
- Right of way on Middle Belt Road from Eureka to Sibley—\$131,250.
- Reconstruction of Pennsylvania Road from Telegraph to Allen Road, two-lane reinforced concrete—\$889,130.
- Right of way on Sheldon Road from Five Mile Road to Hines Drive—\$150,000.
- Reconstruction of Sheldon Road, from the Chesapeake and Ohio Railroad tracks to Five Mile Road, to five-lane reinforced concrete—\$574,440.
- Reconstruction of Middle Belt, from North Line to Eureka, into five-lane reinforced concrete—\$641,300.
- Reconstruction of Wayne Road, from the New York Central tracks to the Lower Rouge River into five-lane reinforced concrete—\$641,300.
- Reconstruction of Wixom Road, from Middle Belt to Workingman's Road, into two-lane reinforced concrete—\$778,240.

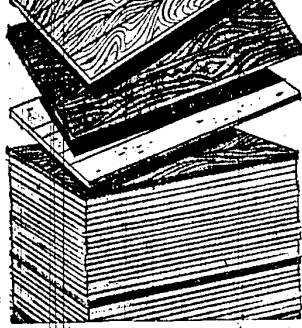
