EAST LANSING — Although the rate of growth in Michigan's financial institutions will continue to climb to a record \$12.4 billion by the end of the year, according to a Michigan State University financial specialist.

Dr. Richard H. Pettway, writing in the current issue of the Michigan State Economic Record, reports that Michigan's savings institutions will add about \$1.3 billion to their savings totals by the end of 1966, compared to a growth of \$1.42 billion in 1965.

The decrease in savings growth, he added, is less in Michigan than the national average.

Dr. Pettway said that while banks will probably have a slightly reduced rate of savings growth in the final two quarters, their market share of savings in Michigan will grow to an estimated 67.1 per cent, a bit higher than last year.

Westland's Stockmeyer Retains Wayne U. Post

The proud distinction of being the only Westland person to win a state-wide office in the recent elections goes to Norman O. Stockmeyer, who retained his seat on the Wayne State University Board of Governors.

The Republican candidate, who was named to the post earlier this year by Gov. George Romney to fill a vacancy, won the position in his own right in the Nov. 8 elections.

The 58-year-old realtor, who lives with his family at 38042 Glenwood Road, owns an impressive list of qualifications for the Wayne State post—although he has a son and daughter attending other universities.

Stockmeyer, a native of Caseville, Mich., has been active in Western Wayne County business, political, and community groups for many years.

These include being Michigan Chairman of President Dwight D. Eisenhower's Inaugural Committee in 1956; Wayne County Republican

Chairman from 1958-62; and secretary for the Republican State Central Committee from 1957-65.

In 1951, Stockmeyer won the Distinguished Alumni Award from Wayne State, from which he graduated with a bachelor of arts degree in 1929; in recognition of his outstanding activities and service which reflects honor upon the university.

He also received the Michigan Jaycee Fellowship Award for outstanding civic leadership.

Stockmeyer graduated from Northwestern High School, Detroit, and attended Wayne and Harvard Universities, which awarded him a master's degree in business administration in 1932.

In later years he served on the Wayne Community School District Board of Education from 1944-1961; president of the Wayne County Board of Education during the 1955-56 year; Regional Chairman of the President's White House Conference on Education in 1955; and trustee of Detroit Institute of Technology.

In civic affairs, he served on the NACA Committee of Management; Wayne County Mental Health Society; Neighborhood Service Board.

An active realtor, Stockmeyer is president of the Wayne Investment Company, director of the Livonia National Bank and Wayne Bank; 1952 president of the Detroit Real Estate Board and 1960 president of the Michigan Real Estate Association.

In church life, Stockmeyer is a trustee of the First Congregational Church of Detroit; moderator in 1962 of the Congregational Association of Detroit; and served on the Council of Churches Committee on Church Renewal.

Stockmeyer and his wife, Lillian, have two sons, Paul, now attending University of Michigan on a math teaching fellowship; and Norman, Jr., an attorney and two daughters, Carol Ann, a senior at Northwestern University, Ill., and Mrs. Lena Harris, teacher and housewife.

Residents in Garden City contributed a total of \$1,868 to the 1966 Torch Drive in the house-to-house canvass or 68.1 per cent of its quota. Small businesses in Garden City contributed \$1,125 or 138.9 per cent of the quota.

Westland contributed a total of \$3,192 or 7.29 per cent of its quota; with small businesses contributing \$1,300 or 37.6 per cent of quota.

Farmington met its small business quota and over, with \$5,096 or 136.6 per cent and from residents Farmington area contributed a total of \$17,350 or 97.5 per cent.

Torch Drive figures from Redford Township represented 88.2 per cent or a total of \$4,022 from residents and 120 per cent or a total of \$2,940.

Torch Drive totals for Livonia were announced as highly successful. From North Livonia area a total of \$4,439 representing 93.1 per cent of quota. South Livonia gave \$8,126 or 105.7 per cent.

Small businesses contributed \$1,934 or 104 per cent; and in North Livonia the community business campaign total was \$2,853 or 150.9 per cent of quota.

Livonians have individually benefited from the UF foundation's monies, but for the first time will receive a community benefit. A total of \$600,000 has been earmarked from the UF Capital Improvement Fund to build a YMCA Branch in Livonia.
