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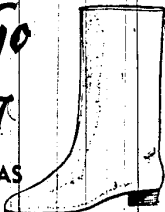
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# Planners Delay Public Hearing

Brennan, who is noted for his caustic tongue and quite frequently bait Brown, broke in and said: "You can't make a motion, Wendell, you can only suggest as you are not a member of this body. If you wish to make motions run for office again and see how far you get."

When the matter came up again before the Planning Commission, Brennan was opposed by a vociferous group of residents from Franklin Fairways and Franklin Forest. The Commission again rejected the request for rezoning.

The real estate company took the matter to the Circuit Court where the Township lost the case.

Township Attorney Brennan disagreed with the Planners decision pointing out that the Township Board would be not to carry the case any further and that official Township policy seemed to call for an office classification at the corner.

Brennan warned that when the existing residential zoning in the corner lapsed any one could request a building permit and could erect any sort of a structure.

Brown, who is representing the residents of the area, said that he had filed an intervening suit which would be decided Monday and that if this were denied he would carry the case to a higher court.

In summation Brown said that "he had made a motion" to the Planning Commission

(Continued from Page 1) port to an independent study of the various avenues open to the community.

The consensus among the Trustees was that such a study would "clear the air" and provide the facts to the people. They made it clear, however, that by giving its support to the plan the Township would not hold off on any action fighting annexation attempts or should another incorporation vote come up.

Township Trustee Earl Oppertzhauer said that he wanted to go on record that by endorsing the study "I for one do not want it interpreted in any way, shape or form that I am endorsing the idea of consolidation or predicting the outcome of the study."

"One of the most glaring problems that I can see in the future which would prevent consolidation with the City is the different means of financing capital improvements," he asserted. Township Supervisor Curt Hall echoed this feeling and added that "I think members of the Board have grave doubts about whether consolidation with the City would be possible. At the present time some very complex bookkeeping problems would arise in order to come up with an equitable solution for the residents of the Township."

This was an obvious reference to Brown's bid for the GOP nomination for auditor in August where the incumbent, Ed Brown, roundly trounced the Brown team.

At this point Brown set his temper and asked Brennan why the residents were not informed of the case and why the resident most directly affected, Alexander J. Gordon, was not called to testify.

Brennan retorted by asking if Gordon or any of Brown's clients could give "expert" real estate testimony and termed Brown's comments "a lot of baloney."

Lorion then called the meeting to order and told both men to "simmer down" asserting that "we must bring some order out of this chaos."

Brennan told the Planning Commission that the tactics of the residents were, at best, "delaying" and that the Township could find no expert witness to testify in favor of the zoning.

"You people have rejected the advice of the Planner on this corner (twice) and when all the chips are down I can't say that the court was wrong."

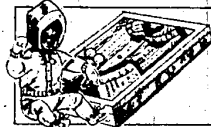
## Expensive Driving

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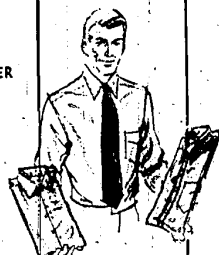
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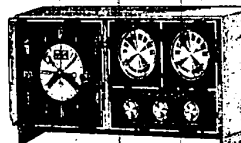
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
