Mr. and Mrs. Robin Reed, who have appeared with their marionettes nationwide, including very successful appearances at the Detroit Art Institute Auditorium, were in Livonia last year under the L.E.G. auspices to do their highly imaginative and delightful rendition of "The Wizard of Oz."

The Reed's version of "Pinocchio" features 21 hand-crafted, one-third life sized marionettes in this tale of the run-away wooden puppet. They have held closely to the original book in their script so all the beloved characters appear, such as: old Geppetto, the woodcarver; Long-Beard, the Giant; Jimmy Cricket; the crafty Fox and Cat; and the Blue Fairy.

In addition, the Reeds have worked out a method of staging "Pinocchio" with continuous action, so as to not bore the pre-schoolers, and have developed techniques for controlling up to a dozen puppets on stage at one time.

## Wayne Lists New Off-Campus Courses

## One-Man Grand Jury Based on Common Law

The Michigan one-man grand jury is a distinguished weapon of our state's arsenal of law enforcement. The Attorney General has made good use of it to protect the Michigan public during the last few months.

A portion of the Michigan Criminal Code provides for inquiry into alleged criminal activity in a circuit judge when the court grants a petition of the attorney general or prosecuting attorney who shows the court that there is probable cause to suspect the occurrence of a criminal offense.

This law is a modernization of an ancient and honorable proceeding having its roots deep in the English common law.

The statute provides for the summoning of witnesses and their examination, for punishment of witnesses neglecting to answer questions, and for protection of the accused in a locked, separate container.

Thereafter, the accused is dealt with according to criminal law including, of course, the right to a fair trial.

In a case holding that the one-man grand jury is a proper judicial proceeding, the Michigan Supreme Court has quoted the United States Supreme Court, to the effect that a proceeding before a grand jury constitutes "a judicial inquiry of the most ancient lineage."

It is a strong sentiment upon the ramparts of liberty.

At the Flint meeting of the Michigan Library Association, the first annual Librarian of the Year award was presented to Walter J. Kaiser, Director of Wayne County Libraries.

"Each year outstanding librarians will be recognized for their past, present, and future contributions to the field of library science in the State of Michigan," stated Mrs. Mary Mitchell, President, Michigan Library Association.

"Our choice for 1966, Walter Kaiser, for the first such award, was most appropriate, for the Librarian has looked to Kaiser and his many creative contributions for the last 25 years as the leader in the field of library science," concluded President Mitchell.

During Kaiser's 21 years as the head of the Wayne County Library system, the list of his achievements is long and noteworthy.

The scroll of recognition presented at the Flint meeting highlighted the following accomplishments and states Kaiser has:

Developed at Wayne County the synchronized conveyor book processing procedure.

Created a model federated library system particularly noteworthy in its development and application of support formulas.

Initiated new and imaginative approaches to all phases of library services and community involvement.

The 1966 Librarian of the Year, receives in addition to the formal recognition of his achievements, a check for \$100.

## Job Corps Recruits Are Sought

In line with the President's efforts towards a "Great Society," and to enable youth of today to hold "tomorrow's job," the Michigan Employment Security Commission's Inkster Youth Service is recruiting young men for the Job Corps from Western Wayne County, including Livonia, Redford Township, Garden City and Westland.

The Job Corps is a program designed to help fellows who want a fresh start. It offers job training, further education, and a home base in another section of the country.

A young man can stay in the Job Corps for as long as two years, and receive \$30 per month spending money, while the Job Corps puts \$50 per month aside for him for each month of satisfactory service.

This, plus free room and board, clothing, education and training, make a package which is difficult to beat.

Youths, 16 through 24 years of age who have either graduated or dropped out of school, who are not working steadily or are unemployed with few job skills, and who want and need a chance to progress may be eligible.

"They can learn, earn, train and join at their own speed," said Charles Foster, manager of the Inkster Youth Service.
