## THE FUNERAL OF OWEN BOTSFORD

Under Guard of U. S. Marines and the Impressive Ceremonies of the Masonic Order Were Used

The remains of Owen St. Aubin Botsford, who passed away about seven weeks ago at Shanghai, China, arrived in Detroit Sunday night, accompanied by his wife and the army quartermaster general Lieutenant Botsford was stricken while on duty on the gunboat Quiros in the Yang-tse river off Wusung and Hankow. Lieutenant Botsford was then commander of the gunboat Quiros, which had been ordered up the Yang-tse on account of the revolutionary trouble and to guard the interests of American citizens in troublous districts.

The funeral ceremonies for Lieutenant Botsford in Shanghai were the largest and most notable ever accorded an officer of his rank.

Owen St. Aubin Botsford was the only son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank P. Botsford of Clarenceville and was born April 17, 1885. He graduated from the Farmington high school in June 1901, and also from the Central high school in 1902. After attending the U. S. M. in 1903-4 he was appointed to the U. S. Naval academy at Annapolis, graduating in 1908.

Nearly two years ago he went to the Far East on the cruiser Colorado but was shortly after transferred to the Quiros and had been in Chinese waters most of the time. Shortly before sailing from San Francisco he was quietly married in the Cathedral of San Diego to Miss Betty Calkins, daughter of R. L. Calkins, an official of the New York Central railroad, after a brief and romantic courtship. During their sojourn in Shanghai, Lieutenant and Mrs. Botsford became very popular in the local social set.

The funeral was held from the home of his parents in Clarenceville Wednesday afternoon at two o'clock. The services were conducted by Farmington lodge, F. & A. M. under the direction of the master, Frank Allyn.

The body was guarded by U. S. marines and the casket, which was hidden beneath folds of the American flag was further banked with beautiful floral pieces. He was laid to rest in Oakwood cemetery and before his body was lowered to its last resting place his remains were given final military honors by a gun salute and the bugle.

Besides the widow and parents, the deceased leaves one sister, Miss Elizabeth Botsford, and a host of friends.

Owen Botsford, who was a graduate of the class of 1901 of the Farmington high school, was the first graduate of the school to pass away and these classes number from the year 1890. All the members of his class with one exception, were in attendance at the funeral—Henry Thomas of Fremont, O.; Daisy Cook Teague of Clarenceville, Emory, Hatton of Detroit and Jennie Ely Melow of Farmington. Mrs. Anna Wolfe Bond of Washington state was also a member of this class, but was not present. The love of these classmates to Owen and sympathy to the bereaved ones was evidenced by a lovely floral piece—a broken wheel.

Mr. and Mrs. James Conroy of Fremont, O., visited this week at Dr. and Mrs. E. F. Holcomb. They attended the funeral of the former's cousin, Owen Botsford.

Thousands of men are supplied with jobs every year without a cent of cost and, in addition, employers are learning to depend upon the bureau for help.

If the farmers throughout this section would only make application to the bureau much of the trouble caused by lack of help would be obviated. There's no expense connected with it. All that is necessary is to get word to the Michigan Free Employment Bureau, 42 Larned street, west Detroit, stating what kind of help is required and it will be supplied.

Attorney Minock is now engaged in making trouble for the private employment agencies in the city that are doing business in violation of the law and already has a number of proprietors bound over for trial and many more cases pending.
