Get New Teacher At Nursery

Loveland Children's Nursery, 33015 West Seven Mile Livonia, last week welcomed Mrs. Margaret Rogez as its new director.

Mrs. Rogez, who has been a resident of Livonia for three years, attended Annapolis College. She has worked with children at the preschool level in Wayne State University's experimental school and as a substitute elementary teacher in Dearborn.

The Loveland Children's Nursery offers a complete program for the preschooler. As a state-licensed day-care center it accepts children on a full-time, half-day or part-time basis. Beginning Jan. 16, 1969, it is initiating a Director's Special Afternoon Program which promises to be an interesting and stimulating activity for children of the nursery school age.

The activities will begin at 1 p.m. and continue until the 5 p.m. dismissal time. The program will consist of story time, handicraft, art projects, creative rhythms and games.

A special tuition rate is offered at \$10 per week with the child to be enrolled for the complete term of the program.

New Course To Teach Reading

Oakland University's novel use of a "national" faculty for graduate courses in the teaching of reading will be promoted next semester into the upper grades.

Seven noted authorities on reading techniques will share the classroom with Harry T. Hahn, professor of education at OU, in a new graduate course for teachers, "Teaching Reading in the Upper Grades (4 through 12)." Hahn said the successful experience of a similar class at the primary grade level introduced last fall encouraged OU to expand the program into the higher level.

The prominent educators—all authors, researchers and teachers—will conduct seven convocations to discuss current and promising practices for teaching reading. These will be followed by seven small-group seminars to insure opportunities for thoughtful reaction and elaboration on the part of the class members. Hahn said.

The class will meet on Wednesdays from Jan. 11 through April 19. Participating teachers will attend the class from 4:30 to 6 p.m., take a one-hour break for dinner and then return to class from 7 to 8:30 p.m.

Hahn said the class would be of particular advantage for teachers of social studies or science, as well as those engaged directly in the teaching of reading, and would be of value to any teacher interested in expanding his familiarity with reading fundamentals.

Four semester hours of credit will be given for the course. The fee will be \$88.

Hahn, a noted reading specialist, will direct the course. Interested teachers should call or write the Oakland University Admissions Office, 338-7211, ext. 2043, for application information now. Applications must be in prior to registration, which will be held on Jan. 3 and 4.
