

Adult Education Program

Farmington's Adult Education Program begins its winter term the week of Jan. 16. Approximately 45 classes will be offered in several areas ranging from business to fine arts to homemaking.

Classes will also be offered for high school credit. Registration for the session will be held in the main lobby of the Farmington High School, Wednesday, Jan. 11, and Thursday, Jan. 12, from 6:30 to 9 p.m.

New classes in the program are:

- "DeCoupage," at 17th century art-craft of permanently decorating with cut-out designs with the effect of hand decoration. This method allows the individual an opportunity to use designs to create his own compositions with a person's imagination being the only limitation. The class will meet Tuesday evenings for 10 weeks at North Farmington.
- For adults who wish to make professional looking draperies the drapery making course is offered. Students must be able to sew and the instructor will be available on registration evenings for consultation. Classes will meet 10 Monday evenings at Farmington High School.
- "Let's Learn to Speak English" is intended for foreign language speaking adults. The class will help students to increase their command and knowledge of English and will meet Wednesday evenings for 10 weeks at Farmington High School.
- A course in Income Tax Preparation will meet for six weeks on Thursday evenings.

An Ordinance to amend Ordinance No. 29 of the Township of Farmington enacted:

"An Ordinance enacted under Act 184, Public Act of 1943, as amended, governing the unincorporated portions of the Township of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, to regulate and restrict the location and use of buildings, structures and land for trade, industry, residence and for public and semi-public or other specified uses; and to regulate and limit the height and bulk of buildings and other structures; to regulate and to determine the size of yards, courts and open spaces; to regulate and limit the density of population; and for said purposes to divide the Township into districts and establishing the boundaries thereof; providing for changes in the regulations, restrictions and boundaries of such districts, defining certain terms used herein; providing for enforcement; establishing a Board of Appeals; and imposing penalties for the violation of this Ordinance."

IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED by the Township Board of the Township of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan:

SECTION ONE.

That the zoning map of said Ordinance No. 29, as amended, be, and the same is hereby amended to show RC-2, multiple residence district classification for lots numbered 20 through 37 inclusive, and 0, office building district for lots numbered 18, 19, 38, 39, 40, 41 and 42, all of Supervisor's plot of Westhill Woods of the N.W. 1/4 of Section 26, all of said lots being formerly zoned RA-3, single residence district classification.

SECTION TWO.

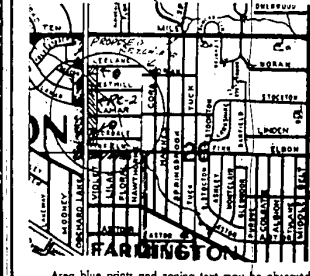
All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed only to the extent necessary to give this Ordinance full force and effect.

The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby ordered to take effect upon publication of the Ordinance in the Farmington Observer, Farmington, Michigan.

SECTION FOUR.

This Ordinance is hereby declared to have been adopted by the Township Board of the Township of Farmington, County of Oakland, State of Michigan, at a meeting thereof duly called and held on the day of January, 1967, and ordered to be given publication in the manner prescribed by law.
