

the City would pay half the cost.

At this point, Mrs. Valen-  
cics told *The Observer*, her  
husband decided to have the  
City do the work at a cost of  
30 cents per square foot.

City Manager John Dini-  
sini told the Council that  
the employees the Valen-  
cics talked to was new and mis-  
understood the policy. He  
added that the City pays  
half the cost for street paving  
on such streets because of  
the general traffic con-  
ditions, but that it has no  
such policy on sidewalks.

Allen asserted that while it  
was an honest mistake he  
thought the City should stand  
behind its word and pay half  
the costs.

Dini asserted that seven  
or eight corner lots were in-  
volved in the sidewalk pro-  
gram and that "if we do this  
for one lot then we should do  
it for all."

Brotherton stated that he  
felt the misunderstanding  
was unfortunate and that he  
couldn't see where the matter  
had actually cost the Valen-  
cics any money. "If it had  
cost more money because  
they waited for the City to  
do the work on this basis  
then it would be a different  
matter," he added.

Following the Council ses-  
sion Mrs. Valen-  
cics told *The Observer* that she thought  
that her husband would have  
at least gotten some bids  
for the work to see if he could  
have had it done for less than  
the cost. "However, when my husband learned  
that the City would pay half  
the cost if it did the work  
he didn't pursue the matter  
any further," she commented.

In other action the Council:

• Voted to vacate Oakland  
Ave. from Longacre Rd. to  
the west line of the Wood-  
croft Subdivision, while re-  
taining a 30-foot easement for  
public utilities; and

• Named John Allen the  
Council's representative to  
Wolverine Boy's State and  
voted to sponsor a boy this  
year at the cost of \$50.

the Planning Commission held a public hearing on the proposed rezoning to office after the court decision had been handed down. Residents of the area turned out in force and pleaded for a chance to take the matter to Court and make themselves heard.


