

Buback, Bommarito Fight Move to Transfer Trial

Defense attorneys for Wayne County Sheriff Peter Buback and Undersheriff James Bommarito will appeal a court ruling which would move their wilful neglect of duty trial to another county.

Circuit Court Judge Carl M. Weideman ruled Thursday in favor of a motion by Assistant Attorney General Robert Goussy to move the trial outside of Wayne County. Goussy felt that the change would be made since the jurors in the Buback and Bommarito case would be in charge of sheriff's deputies, who are officially employees of the two defendants.

Judge Weideman commented that the City-County Building doesn't have proper jury facilities and in the past, materials have been declared because jurors have been approached outside of the courtroom by persons in-

involved in the pending court case.

Ivan E. Barris, defense attorney for Buback and Bommarito said that the judge was erroneous and he had abused his discretion.

"This is just another effort by the state to delay trial of this matter so that the removal proceedings against the sheriff can be concluded," Barris said. "If Buback is removed by the governor before this case is heard, we do not think he would get a fair trial anywhere."

Buback and Bommarito were charged with four counts of wilful neglect of duty by one man grand juror Edward S. Piggins in the aftermath of the Westland (then Nankin Township) traffic ticket fixing scandal in late 1965.

Both were charged with criminal neglect and a hearing to remove the sheriff from office has not been scheduled as yet.

Weideman also cited newspaper publicity for his agreeing to move the trial out of Wayne County. He said that the general publicity "might interfere" with a fair trial.

In the rear of the salesroom is a large warehouse and stockroom that includes several thousand tires and a complete line of automotive parts.

The service department, under the supervision of veteran Tony Olaszewski, who has been with Goodyear for more than 30 years in a capacity of service manager and worker, includes 10 bays. It is equipped to handle all types of car repairs, ranging from minor to the major types of work.

GC Trio Learn Fate Monday

A milestone in the first warrants issued by one man Grand Juror George E. Bowles will be reached next Monday.

That's the time when three former Garden City officials may know if they will have to stand trial on charges of conspiring to defraud the public and illegal misuse of public funds in the 1961 purchase of land where the Civic Center is now located.

With no more witnesses to be heard, the state attorney general's office and defense attorneys will make their final arguments in the preliminary examination being held by Wayne Municipal Judge John Seiler.

The defendants are Edwin J. Freeh, Jr., Eugene Salvatore, and Evan Callinan, who were in 1961, City Clerk-Treasurer, City Comptroller, and City Attorney, respectively.

Judge Seiler will decide after the arguments are finished whether there is probable cause to believe that the charges are true and that the three defendants have committed them.

Key witness in the three-day long examination held in mid-December was retired realtor William New who was approached by Salvatore to buy the three lots on Middlebelt north of Ford Road for the community.

New testified that on July 1, 1961, he was given an \$80,160 check as the balance of the purchase price of \$83,160. Later in the day, in Callinan's office, Salvatore walked in and took \$12,000 in cash from the briefcase containing the money.

The check, dated July 6, 1961 was issued two weeks before the City Council officially approved the appropriation.

Freeh, who along with his co-defendants have maintained their innocence in the case, was mayor at the time of the issuing of the warrants, which came just 12 days before the election at which he was running for a second term.

He lost his reelection bid by 1,900 efforts.

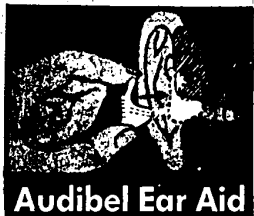

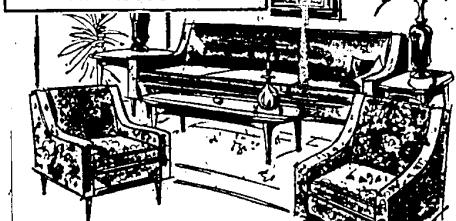
