### Farmington Policemen To Enroll at OCC

Four of Farmington's police officers — two from the City force and two from the Township — will begin classes at the newly established Oakland Police Academy of the Oakland Community College on March 6.

More than 50 police officers representing 18 communities are expected to enroll in the six-week program which offers six hours of college credit.

Robert Deadman, chief of the City police, said that a new patrolman, James Peak, was enrolled. "At least one other officer from the force will attend a class," he said. In the Township, Irving H. Yakes, said that a new officer, Steve Poynite, would attend the course along with one other patrolman who is yet to be named.

atives of the committee met with representatives of Oakland Community College to discuss the possibility of establishing a training program at OCC.

Confident that the Police Science Program being conducted at the college was of the caliber needed and that the College could provide necessary facilities, it was the decision of the committee to establish the academy at OCC.

The six-week session will consist of a five-day, 40-hour week and will deal primarily with Fundamentals of Police Operations and Principles and Applications of Criminal Law, but will also include other police and related subjects. This basic police training program is designed to provide new police officers with a firm understanding of the application of sound law enforcement practices. Other communities, which are expected to enroll personnel in the course, are Birmingham, Bloomfield Hills, Huntington Woods, Keego Harbor, Madison Heights, Milford, Oak

Park, Pleasant Ridge, Pontiac, Rochester, Royal Oak, Royal Oak Township, Southfield, Troy, Waterford and the Kensington Park Range.

Plans are under way for a second course of study to begin in October.

An Ordinance to amend Ordinance No. 29 of the Township of Farmington entitled:

"An Ordinance enacted under Act 184, Public Acts of 1943, as amended, governing the unincorporated portions of the Township of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, to regulate and restrict the location and use of buildings, structures and land for trade, industry, residence and for public and semi-public or other specified uses; and to regulate and limit the height and bulk of buildings and other structures; and to determine the size of yards, courts and open spaces; to regulate and limit the density of population; and for said purposes to divide the Township into districts and establishing the boundaries thereof; providing for changes in the regulations, restrictions and boundaries of such districts; defining certain terms used herein; providing for enforcement; establishing a Board of Appeals; and imposing penalties for the violation of this Ordinance."

IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED by the Township Board of the Township of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan:

SECTION ONE: That the zoning map of said Ordinance No. 29, as amended, be, and the same is hereby amended to show RC-2, multiple residence district classification for lots numbered 20 through 37 inclusive, and 0, office building district for lots numbered 18, 19, 35, 37, 40, 41 and 42, all of Supervisor's plot of Waverly Woods of the N.W. 1/4 of Section 26, all of said lots bring formerly zoned RA-3, single residence district classification.

SECTION TWO: All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed only to the extent necessary to give this Ordinance full force and effect.

SECTION THREE: The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby ordered to take effect upon publication of the Ordinance in the Farmington Observer, Farmington, Michigan.

SECTION FOUR: This Ordinance is hereby declared to have been adopted by the Township Board of the Township of Farmington, County of Oakland, State of Michigan, at a meeting thereof duly called and held on the \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_, 1967, and ordered to be given publication in the manner prescribed by law.

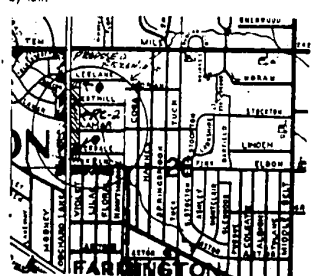

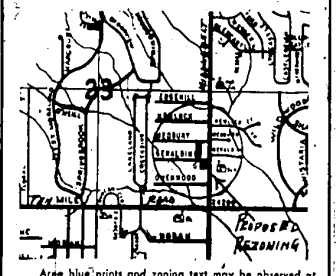

On the program was representatives of Michigan's State Inter-Agency Cadre. Dr. Donald Sellin is the Director of the Cadre composed of: Miss Gail Harris of the State Department of Education, Mrs. Adena Peterson of the State Department of Social Welfare, Henry Zimmerman of the State Department of Mental Health, Don Harrison of the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation, and Dr. Roy Smith of State Department of Public Health.

The Inter-Agency has the responsibility of advising in the implementation of all services for the mentally retarded in accordance with the Michigan State Plan. This plan provides comprehensive services developed as a result of the reports of the Regional Planning Committees who studied under a Federal Grant the problems of the retarded in all of the regions of the State of Michigan. Oakland County's Planning Subcommittee on Mental Retardation, under the chairmanship of Mrs. Frank Zisch of Royal Oak, included members from many professions and agencies in the county.
