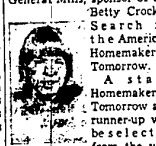

The sale of the Farmington Dairy to the Ira Wilson & Sons Dairy Co. was announced last week.

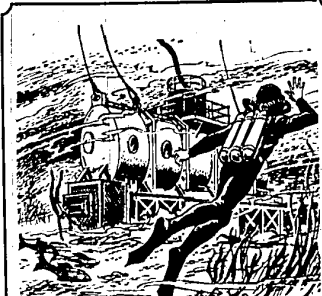
The 46-year-old Farmington Dairy has gone out of business and the Wilson Company has taken over the home delivery and wholesale sales of the firm.
