Telephone Company Says It Will Expand Local Service

Michigan Bell Telephone Company announced today that it will spend \$1,247,000 in 1967 to expand and improve communications facilities in Farmington.

The local outlay is part of the \$184 million Michigan Bell will spend throughout Michigan during the year. The statewide sum equals last year's record peak.

Michigan Bell president said in Detroit that last year's program went a long way toward helping the company

"catch up with the unprecedented demand for and high usage of telephone service."

"Our 1967 program, as last year's, is designed not only to meet the continuing demand for basic telephone service, but to give every Michigan Bell customer the type and quality of service he wants and expects from us," Day said.

Noting that much of the capital to finance the construction program must come from investors, Day said the magnitude of this year's expenditures reflects the company's confidence in the continuing economic health of Michigan.

"We expect to continue to gain telephones this year at a very rapid rate," he said, "and our forecasts of this certainly are not based on a weakening of the state's economy."

Part of the huge demand placed on company facilities, he said, stems from the fact that more and more customers are requesting better grades of service (one-party

versus two-party), and that customers in general are using their telephones more.

Hughes C. Bronaugh, Michigan Bell manager here, said the total expenditure for Farmington would be allotted as follows:

Outside plant facilities, \$403,000; telephone equipment in homes and offices, \$362,000; central office equipment, \$198,000.

Statewide, Michigan Bell will place more exchange cable in 1967 than it ever did in a single year — a record 11.4 billion conductor feet.

Michigan Bell will start eight new telephone buildings during the year along with 26 building additions.

Nine more communities will be tied into the Direct Distance Dialing network in 1967, bringing to 95 per cent the number of Michigan Bell customers able to dial their own long distance calls.

The program of central office modification to accommodate Tough Tone telephone service will continue in Farmington in 1967 and in several outstate offices.
