

# Esch Introduces Job Training Bill

Second District Congressman Marvin L. Esch has introduced legislation to encourage job training by private industry. The bill, entitled "The Human Investment Act of 1967," would provide a 10 per cent tax credit to employers for expenses incurred in training their employees in certain job skills.

Esch described the measure as "a step toward ending widespread unemployment through training incentives for private enterprise which is the nation's greatest job creator and trainer."

"This is an approach which recognizes the need for participation of the private sector in solving this," he added. The Human Investment Act specifically gives employers incentive to broaden and expand various programs including apprenticeship training, on-the-job training, cooperative work-study projects, tuition refunds and organizing group and classroom instruction expenses.

"Giving employers a tax credit for training and re-training," Esch said, "is an efficient and sensible approach. Unlike government run training programs, private training involves less red tape and, more importantly, is aimed at available jobs."

He predicted passage of the bill "would go a long way in initiating and expanding programs like that about to get

## Mechanization of Files Saves State \$750,000

LANSING—Mechanization of the Department of State's driver license central file will save the state \$201,290 in fiscal 1966-67, and \$549,910 in fiscal 1967-68, Secretary of State James M. Hare disclosed.

It is the official state repository for all driving records including abstracts of convictions and records of suspensions and revocations.

Hare bases estimates on the current workload on the central file as compared with production figures from past years.

He noted projected savings figures only cover personnel, equipment, and space. He noted that the savings do not include such items as recruitment costs, employer turnover, etc.
