

Clarenceville Schools Hire Business Manager

Edward Saliz, of Lincoln, has been named to the Clarenceville School district by recently created post of business manager for the Board of Education.

Saliz already is on the job. He was an employee of the Southern Wayne County Economic Opportunity Group, Inc. in Flat Rock. Previously he served as business manager for Muskegon Catholic Central High and credit union.

As of Feb. 13 school lunches will cost five to 10 cents more. School officials said the increase was due to increased cost of supplies, food and labor in the hot lunch program.

One of the major factors was the reduced amount of government surplus commodities now available to schools. As the low cost items become more difficult to get through the government program, the school system must purchase them at much higher prices.

The new lunch prices will climb to 35 cents for elementary pupils, 40 cents for secondary students and 50 cents for adults.

Chocolate milk will be hiked one cent to three cents per carton.

School officials expressed concern over the effect of the increases on families in the district but indicated a continuing study will be made to keep the program at the lowest possible cost.

School Blaze Boosts Westland's Fire Losses

A \$50,000 fire at the Whitaker Junior High School just one week before the end of the year boosted the Westland Fire Department's fire losses to \$210,000, the highest since 1965.

Before the Dec. 24 fire at the school, in the Livonia School District portion of Westland, the 1965 fire losses in the city would have remained at virtually the same level as the previous year.

In the monthly report issued by Fire Marshal Milton Quiring covering the December period, the department reported a loss of \$201,284 for the year as compared to \$249,536 for 1965.

During the past month, the firemen responded to 133 alarms, an increase of nearly one-third over the 107 figure of the Dec. 1965, period. Of the 133 calls, 95 were for rescue runs.

The full-year totals show that Westland's firemen answered 1,456 calls, as compared to 1,057 the previous year, with the rescue runs, soaring from 487 to 784 in 1966.

Of the 133 calls, only 36 were actually fire alarms with building blazes accounting for 26 of those calls.
