L.W.V. Urge Support Of Fiscal Study

League of Women Voters of Livonia urges every citizen interested in the future of Livonia schools to attend the Fiscal Reform Conference scheduled for 2 p.m., Thursday, March 2 at Bentley High School.

One of the co-sponsors of the conference, the League is now concluding a three year study of the Livonia School District, according to Mrs. William Dayton, education committee chairman for the Livonia LWV.

Following a series of study meetings in which the membership was informed of the education committee's findings, League members reached agreement and adopted a position on certain aspects of the Livonia public schools, Mrs. Dayton explained.

This position includes the League's support of millage proposals to maintain the school system at the present level, as well as the support of alternative sources of income, when they become legally available, to further maintain and improve Livonia schools.

Mrs. Dayton pointed out that until another method of raising revenue is granted to school districts, they must depend solely on property tax revenues. As the burden of property taxes grows, it becomes increasingly urgent to acquire an alternative method of financing schools, she said.

"We are hopeful that the conference Thursday night will encourage local citizens to campaign for a program of fiscal reform which includes sources other than the property tax to operate our schools," Mrs. Dayton said.

Among the speakers at the Fiscal Reform Conference will be Mrs. Everett Straus, former officer of the Detroit League of Women Voters, who will explain the Michigan League's position on fiscal reform.

The Michigan LWV has taken a stand in support of fiscal reform at the state level, including an income tax, to assure a fair and equitable tax structure and to meet growing needs in many fields including education, according to Mrs. John Federspill, Livonia LWV President.

The Michigan League's fight for a state aid distribution should be based on needs, minimum standards, a minimum level of local support, and cost of needed services, and has testified in favor of increased state aid for schools and for allowing counties and cities greater taxing power. The League will continue to support these standards in the State Legislature, Mrs. Federspill said.
