

## Buller Named Principal at Nankin Mills School

Jack W. Buller, acting principal at Nankin Mills Junior High School since November, was promoted to the full position of principal for the remainder of the school year Monday by the Nankin Mills Board of Education.

Acting on the recommendation of Superintendent D. Harlan Hudgins, the school board agreed to appoint Buller at a \$10,700 salary, promoted on the balance of the term.

Buller, 32, was a teacher and counselor for five years before spending the last three years as a counselor, assistant principal and acting principal at the Nankin Mills Junior High.

In a letter to the school board, Hudgins said, "Buller has done an excellent job in administration (under the previous principal) and has carried on in his administrative capacity without a break since November, 1966, when he was named acting principal."

## LIT to Honor Past Student

Lawrence Institute of Technology graduates who were student council presidents since the college was founded in 1932 will be honored March 11.

## Farmington Group Stages Professional Production

Arthur Miller's play "Death of a Salesman" is a classic of the American Theatre. It's a play that demands considerable skill on the part of the actors.

Thus when the Farmington Players announced that it would include the classic in its current season we gulped. This just isn't the usual fare for community theatre and it had all the aspects of being a disaster.

Fortunately it wasn't disastrous. In fact, the production had a professional polish which serves to strengthen one's faith in community theatre.

George Britton appeared as Willy Loman and his professional background was evident in his performance. Britton dominated the stage and there was never any doubt about who was the principal character and the star of the play.

Willy Loman's plight is that of every man. To quote the play it is "man's problem—himself." Very often Miller's dialogue hits very close to home, so it isn't a play that is recommended for those who wish to forget reality during an evening at the theater.

The Farmington production emphasizes the contemporary time and plight. The trilevel set effectively utilized every inch on the tiny stage in the Players Barn. The lighting helped to emphasize the change in location and moods.

Bessie Hannon as Linda, the ever-faithful and long-suffering wife, carried her own weight. The quality of these two performances compensated for the slow start of William Salisbury as Bill. Salisbury seemed to gather momentum as the play progressed and by the end of the production was doing a creditable job.

All in all the Farmington Players production is a standing community theatre. The production runs this Friday and Saturday evening at

## Will Funeral Home Tells Of Danger of "Molesters"

The Harry J. Will Funeral Home, Inc., has launched a child molestation prevention and education program in the area.

Harry J. Will announced his firm is making available to interested adult groups in the area a public service film dealing with the ever-present problem of child molestation.

The 16mm sound-and-color film entitled "The Child Molester" stresses the importance of adults alerting—without alarming children—between the ages of 4 and 14
