

# Risen Christ Church Hears Missionary

The Rev. Brian Seiler, Missionary to New Guinea for the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod, will be the guest speaker on Palm Sunday at the Lutheran Church of the Risen Christ, Plymouth.

Missionary Seiler and Mrs. Seiler, a registered nurse, have entered the Lake Klopago area of New Guinea, which was closed to white men until the 1960's. Pastor Seiler established contact with seven native villages and began teaching Christianity in each of them. Approximately two thousand persons live in each village.

The missionary couple returned to the United States only recently and this will be the first speaking engagement for Rev. Seiler since leaving New Guinea.

Risen Christ members have aided the Seilers while in New Guinea and the Ladies Guild of Risen Christ "adopted" the couple as their personal missionaries, and supplied their needs while they served in the foreign field.

Missionary Seiler is a close relative of the Rev. Dave Romberg, Pastor of Risen Christ. Pastor Seiler will speak at both the 8:30 and 11:00 o'clock worship services on Palm Sunday. A reception for the Seilers will be given at 9:45 in the Chapel, at which time pictures will be shown of their work.

# Allied Jewish Drive to Open Next Week

The 1967 Allied Jewish Campaign will open its six-week drive on Wednesday, March 22, with a public rally at 8:15 p.m. at the Aaron DeRoy Auditorium, Jewish Community Center, 18100 Meyers Road.

Alfred L. Deutsch, chairman, said the campaign is the single federated drive in the Detroit area which raises funds for the support of 54 agencies and social services in Detroit, the nation, Israel and 20 countries overseas. It will close on May 10.

Philip M. Klutznick, of Chicago, former U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations and former international president of B'nai B'rith, will speak at the meeting. A dinner for campaign leaders will precede the rally.

The 1966 Allied Jewish Campaign raised \$55,000 in the Detroit area and campaign leaders hope to exceed that figure during the current drive, Deutsch said.

# Pastor Noe Writes of Lenten Tour's Beginning

(The following report comes from Pastor Herbert Noe of the Galilee Baptist Church, Livonia, who, with his wife, is making a Lenten tour of Bible lands. Their congregation sent them on the trip.)

Cairo—Today I am in the center of Bible antiquities. It hardly seems possible that I left Livonia less than three days ago. After a quick tour of Amsterdam and Paris, we flew to Cairo.

Egypt is mentioned hundreds of times in the Bible, and today for the first time in my life I know I walked where some of the great men of the Bible walked and my eyes saw what they saw.

It was an unusual experience to see for the first time the great pyramids and know that Joseph and Moses and Aaron had also been impressed by their immensity. The largest covers over 12 acres and has enough stone in it to build a highway 20 feet wide and six inches deep from New York to San Francisco.

Next we fly to Beirut, and travel to Damascus and then to Jerusalem.

There is much more to tell of customs, smells, tastes, bargaining, and the temperature, which is a pleasant 75 degrees.

And the Arab people are probably the friendliest we will find on the trip. They love you—and the American dollar! But really, they are most congenial people I like them!

Jerusalem—My wife and I walked today where Jesus walked. We knelt and looked at the place where He was crucified in a manger. With our tour group, we sang "Silent Night," and though it's not Christmas it certainly was not out of season.

Yesterday we traveled the Jerico Road and saw the "Mountain of Temptation." We stood on the bank of the Jordan River where Christ was baptized, and sang with our group, "On Jordan's Stormy Banks."

A few feet from our hotel window we can see the "1937 Lecture Series" where Christ was crucified for the sins of the world, and then today we stood at the place of His Ascension and where He promised to return. This is the Mount of Olives at Bethany.

The weather has been cold and wet, but it hasn't dampened our spirits one bit.

# Bishop Pike Lectures in Area Mar. 20

Bishop James A. Pike will discuss "The New Morality" at 8 p.m. Monday, March 20, in the Southfield High School auditorium, 10 Mile Road and Lahser.

The presentation is part of the "1967 Lecture Series" of Oakland Community College.

The Rev. Pike, who has been accused of heresy on at least three occasions, but has always been exonerated because the issue was to trial, stated that the rejection of "meaningless" doctrines such as the Trinity, the Virgin Birth and the Divinity of Jesus is necessary for the future health of the Christian church.

He recently submitted his resignation from the post of Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of California in order to join the resident staff of the Center for the Study of Democratic Institutions.

Rev. Pike's interest in the faith is in "presenting the center in a way which is more relevant to modern man."

The Center, headed by Dr. Robert M. Hutchins, former Chancellor of the University of Chicago, is devoted to exploring the underlying social, political and philosophical issues confronting modern man.
