

Observer Readers 'Speak Up' On Political Issues

Some Answers In Farmington Editor:

I have been a resident of Farmington Township for better than six years and during that time I have gained a great deal of respect for the Township Administration and their progressive policies. I am proud to be living in Farmington Township.

I also have a great deal of respect for the Observer Newspaper group and their objective reporting.

For these reasons, I have taken the time to write to you, hoping that this letter, or portions thereof, may be published.

The Township Administration, some months ago, after an unsuccessful attempt by the City of Farmington to annex a portion of the Township, foresaw that there would be future attempts to annex portions of the Township; and as duly elected officials, sworn to act on behalf of the township and in the interest of the majority, started incorporation procedures.

Now let us keep in mind that we, the people of Farmington Township, elected the Administration to start incorporation proceedings, defeat the proposal, and then re-elected the Administration. We're hypocrites! We elected these officials to act on our behalf and in our best interests; they do and we slap them back in the face.

When you vote for a person, you vote for him (her) because he is the best person, in your mind, to do the job. If you vote for the wrong person, you have, indeed, fulfilled their expectations.

Because of the continued interest and the many letters, cards and phone calls that I have received in my Lansing office relative to Daylight Savings Time, I would like the citizens of my district (14th District) to know how I voted.

Two weeks ago in the Senate I voted FOR Daylight Saving Time; however, my position was defeated on the Senate floor by a vote of 24-11. The matter is now in the House for action.

The fact that Michigan might exempt itself from the National Uniform Time Act could have some serious implications:

1. Business and Commerce will not be tied in with the rest of the nation's business activity.
2. The National Radio and T.V. show schedule will be in jeopardy.
3. All transport will be on schedules such as airlines, trains and buses will be in a state of confusion.
4. I personally believe crime on the streets would be enhanced by staying on Eastern Standard Time during the summer months.

In the final analysis, I would like to report that I voted the wishes of the majority of my constituents. Out of the hundreds of communications that I received there were only two who requested that we stay on Eastern Standard Time.

Again many thanks for your letters and views on this and other important issues facing the State of Michigan.

Year Round School?
Editor:

At the Fiscal Reform for Quality Education Meeting in Livonia on March 2, James P. O'Neill of the State Board of Education proposed utilizing our schools and teachers

on a year-round basis. Mr. O'Neill pointed out that this would eliminate the present wastefulness of letting these expensive buildings stand idle during the summer. He indicated it would also utilize the teachers three months they are normally idle and, there, not only help reduce the teacher shortage but also enable us to pay the teachers more adequate wages.

He also pointed out that, if we went to a quarterly system, this could reduce the number of dropouts. A child would not get hopelessly behind before he had a chance to catch up. In addition, he stated, instead of presently turning 45 to 50 million kids out on the street, we would reduce this number proportionately. With the limited number out of school at any one time, those interested would have a better opportunity to secure jobs.

The colleges, including our own community college, are doing it, why can't we do it, at least at the high school level?

Mr. O'Neill's proposal for year-round utilization of schools and teachers won wide acceptance among those in its attendance. Would the Livonia Observer consider publishing a community opinion on this proposal? It would be a real public service!
