

Plymouth Twp. Dems Rap Levy

Acting on the premise that too much has been taken for granted and stressing a decided lack of communication between the various segments of the Plymouth Township government, the Democratic precinct delegates of the Township have gone on record as vigorously opposing the one mill levy for purchase of sites for a Township complex, fire stations and cultural and recreational facilities.

The action was taken recently at a meeting of the Plymouth-Northville Democratic organization which is headed by Robert Dwyer of Plymouth.

The Township delegates indicated they were disturbed by the conflicting comments of the supervisor in a recent metropolitan newspaper.

Supervisor John McEwen was quoted by the reporter as saying "the millage will be used for a site for a township complex."

The statement came within a day of a story in the Observer in which Treasurer Mrs. Elizabeth Holmes and Trustees Ralph Garber and Louis Norman had outlined plans for the purchase of numerous sites with a total of 144 acres.

In addition, the delegates pointed out that a Civic Center complex has never been fully discussed to their knowledge.

They stressed that with the controversy over the new route of the proposed expansion of M-14, it would be impossible to pick sites at this time. They stated the plans for the proposed complex had never been taken before the Planning Commission.

The delegates also rapped the Township millage proposal as a direct conflict with a rumored but not yet proposed millage request of the school district.

Lake Pointe Homeowners Support One Mill Levy

The Lake Pointe Homeowners' Association, which has been critical of Plymouth Township Supervisor John McEwen's reassessment program, has gone on record in support of the passage of the proposed one mill levy for the purpose of acquiring and improving sites for a Township complex, fire stations, cultural and recreational facilities.

It was stated by Bureau personnel that there is no standard of assessment values inasmuch as each property is different."

Association officials report the Supervisor reported the following comparison of assessed valuations: Land from \$2,253,050 to \$2,722,880 for an increase of \$7,136,030; buildings from \$20,189,280 to \$25,183,880 for a difference of \$5,004,400.

Plymouth GI Wounded In Vietnam Battle

Lance Corporal Clayton L. "Bud" Kops, USMC, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clayton L. Kops, 366 W. Ann Arbor Trail, Plymouth, was wounded March 11 near Da Nang in South Vietnam.

He received a gunshot wound in the left thigh while on patrol. He has been receiving treatment at the naval hospital in Da Nang, where he was given the Purple Heart.

According to a telegram received by his parents from Gen. Wallace M. Greene, "his condition and prognosis were good."

In a letter dictated to a USO worker, Kops told his parents that he had been wounded by a B.A.R. (Browning Automatic Rifle).

"My leg is in bad shape," he said. "My doctor doubts if I'll regain full use of it again. Don't get the idea that I'm totally deformed or anything, but I'll probably be confined to a wheelchair, crutches, etc. for awhile."

"I do feel pretty lucky to have gotten away with just this—it could be so much worse. Everyone's treating me real well here so the chances for recovery are great."

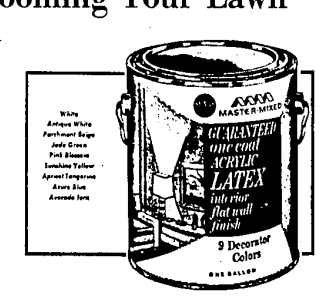
