Chamber Plans Lecture Series For Students

The George Bryant lecture series on radiology, part of the Business-Education program of the Livonia Chamber of Commerce, has been established for science students at Emerson Junior High School. The first lectures of the series has already been given.

The series is conducted by Dr. Robert Hornbeck, Livonia radiologist. Dr. Hornbeck is giving the series of lectures—one each semester—as a donation of his profession to the educational curriculum of Emerson Junior High.

The series is a memorial to George W. Bryant, general chairman of the Livonia Chamber's Business-Education Committee, who died on March 15. The late Mr. Bryant provided the leadership in Business-Education Day last May in which close relationships were established between local teachers and the business and professional community.

Edward M. Segowski, Emerson science teacher, met Dr. Hornbeck when the doctor's Medical X-Ray Clinic on Schoolcraft Road hosted Segowski and a party of teachers during the Chamber's one-day Business-Education program last spring. An all-day orientation on radiology at the doctor's office and facilities resulted in an agreement to carry the experience to Mr. Segowski's students. Thus, the lecture series was established.

Segowski has been seeking to educate his students on the disease of cancer, its danger signals and the means of prevention and possibilities of cure. Foremost among his efforts is developing an understanding of the relationship of smoking to lung cancer.

States Segowski, "I do not at any time preach; I do not lecture. I supply my students with activities. From these experiences, they collect facts and draw their own conclusions."

Segowski sought to inform his students of methods that are employed in diagnosing and treating the disease. At this point, Dr. Hornbeck became a participant in the effort. As a result of his previous contact through the Chamber of Commerce program, Segowski called upon the doctor to assist by discussing his field.

Dr. Hornbeck readily agreed. Medical man.

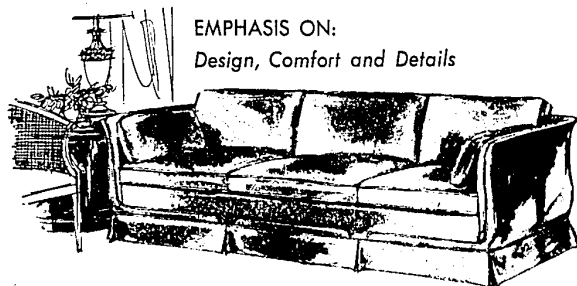
