## Redford Man Named To Edison Co. Post

Appointment of George W. Matthews, of Redford Township, as assistant manager of Edison's Oakland Sales Division has been announced by Division Manager Harlan B. Ritze.

Matthews started working for Detroit Edison during summer vacations while earning his bachelor's degree at the University of Michigan and joined the company full time soon after graduation in 1941.

From his first assignment as a customer clerk he advanced through a series of sales department posts and had been assistant manager of the Detroit-Wayne Division for three years before his transfer to Oakland County.

An elder at Central Woodward Christian Church in Detroit, Mr. Matthews also serves as first vice-president of the Detroit Council of Churches and was named "Layman of the Year" in 1965 by that group.

He is a deputy commissioner for the Detroit Area Council for the Boy Scouts, a former member of the board of managers of the Downtown (Detroit) Branch of the YMCA and a past-president of the Detroit Junior Board of Commerce.

In 1954 he was awarded both the Detroit Edison Company's Alex Dow Award and the Detroit Junior Board of Commerce title "Outstanding Young Man of the Year," for his leadership in many civic, community and religious activities.

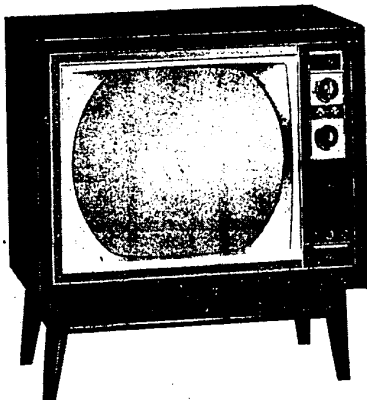
