

Little League To Sell Candy

In a boy's mind, "spring" and "baseball" are synonymous, and it's that time of year for the young players of the North Farmington-West Bloomfield Baseball for Boys organization.

But it takes some doing to field a league of 83 teams, to provide suitable baseball diamonds and new uniforms and equipment for 1200 players. So the organization will conduct a candy sale April 29 through May 8 to raise the necessary \$6,000 expense money.

Twelve hundred boys, ages 8 through 16, will call at homes in Farmington and West Bloomfield, selling special boxes of candy, in their only fundraising activity of the year.

The league is divided into five groupings, according to age. There are 20 teams in the "Tee Ball" group for ages 8 and 9, 22 "Minors" teams for ages 9 and 10, 16 "Major" teams for the 11's and 12's, seven "Pony" teams for the boys 13 and 14 and eight "Colt" teams for the oldest players, 15 and 16.

Robert Eady, 32310 Sprucewood, Farmington, candy sale chairman, announced that the boys also will be working for such prizes as transistor radios, a camera, flashlight, baseball gloves, bats and baseballs, to be awarded to the top candy salesmen.

Eady also stated that candy, which will be delivered, may be ordered during the sale by calling him at GR 4-0850.

Omni Spectra Announces Moving Date

Located presently in Southfield, the company has produced parts used in the communication and guidance equipment of Surveyor III which began sending photographs back to earth shortly after its land April 19.

Omni Spectra products were also used on previous Surveyor spacecraft and the Early Bird and Lani Bird communication satellites.

The company is currently building a plant off Halstead Rd.

Senior Citizen Project Work Is Continued

Oakland Community College has been awarded a government grant of \$23,108 for continuation of its Project SERVE. The grant was made under the provisions of Title I of the Higher Education Act of 1965 and is administered by the State Department of Education.

Project SERVE (Stimulate, Educate, Reassess Volunteer, Employ) seeks to provide opportunities for senior citizens to continue to use their skills in areas in which these skills are in great demand. The Project offers free employment service for senior citizens and serves as a placement bureau for volunteer service.

In addition, Project SERVE offers short courses for senior citizens in such areas as Music Appreciation, Creative Writing, Painting and Sculpture, and the Art of Making Friends. Additional courses will be offered in which a number of senior citizens indicate they have an interest, according to Mrs. Betty Setz, Project director.

The Project was initiated last year under the provisions of a similar grant of \$18,000.
