


Driver's Training Is F'ton Summer Program

The Farmington Public Schools will again offer Summer Driver Education to the residents of the school district. The scheduled session will begin June 9 and end Aug. 4.

Participating students must be at least 15 and a half years of age. Older students will be given priority. Students will attend a one hour class each day and will drive approximately two days a week. Faithful attendance is necessary to fulfill local and state requirements.

Registration for the 1967 Driver Education Session will take place at the Farmington Board of Education Building, 32500 Shilawassee, on April 21, 8 a.m. to 12 noon and May 6, 8 a.m. to 12 noon.

Dems Set Discussion Of OEO

"The War on Poverty Comes to Farmington" will be the topic of discussion at the next monthly meeting of the Farmington Democratic Club. The Democratic meeting is scheduled for 8 p.m. Wednesday, May 3, at the City National Bank, Ten Mile and Orchard Lake.

The speaker will be Miss Willow Lippert of the Oakland County Commission on Economic Opportunity who has been assigned to work in the Farmington area.

She will outline the activities of the Office of Economic Opportunity (OEO) and report progress made so far in the Farmington area. The OEO program is geared to helping families in need help themselves.

Farmington Democratic Club Chairman Gerald Freedman urged all persons interested in the OEO program to attend the meeting. "Farmington Democratic Club meetings are always open to the public and guests are always welcome," Freedman said.

"The Oakland County war on poverty program has won acclaim, especially the 'Head Start' classes which provide preschool catch-up training for children who come from disadvantaged homes."

Freedman said that the Democrats would also continue to explore ways of correcting the bad road problem in the Farmington area. "We would hope that local officials would give consideration to the suggestions we have already made in this area," Freedman said.

Three Policemen Are OCC Grads

Three Farmington policemen, along with 42 officers from 10 other county departments, graduated last week from the Oakland Police Academy.

Completing the six week intensive basic training program conducted at Oakland Community College were patrolmen Steven Poynter and Patrick Stempien of the township police department and James Peak of the city.

The officers studied all aspects of police work including police operation, principles and applications of criminal law, police courtesy, constitutional law, vice investigation and emergency childbirth.

Pre-College Studies Set at OU

A limited number of openings are still available in Oakland University's Pre-College Study Center, a highly successful four-week program of intensive "briefing" for college-bound students. This will be the fourth year for the Study Center which is scheduled from July 10 through Aug. 4 on the University campus near Rochester.

Science explorations, composition skills, mathematics enrichment and art explorations are being offered in addition to the Study Skills Workshop itself. The academic sessions will be balanced with recreational and cultural programs including the Meadow Brook Music Festival, informal parties in the residence halls, swimming, archery, tennis and special events.

This is the first time that an enrichment course in art has been offered. Introduction to the history of art and basic study of painting, sculpture and printmaking will be given under the direction of Kichi Usui, curator of the Oakland University Art Gallery and visiting assistant art professor.

Faculty for the Pre-College Study Center is made up of eight specialists including Robert M. Erickson, Oakland's director of liberal arts programs and Mott cultural enrichment programs, and Harold J. Abrams, who has guided the study skills program since its beginning.

Recreational programs are available only to resident students of the Pre-College Study Center, so that in order to obtain a complete, well-rounded picture of realistic campus life, resident status is most advisable.
