Township Rezones Four Industrial Lots

In a move intended to preserve the residential flavor of the area, the Farmington Township Board Monday rezoned four lots of Supervisor's Middlebelt 10 Mile Rd. subdivision from light industrial to single family residential.
 The effect of the rezoning, recently recommended by the township planning commission, would be to prevent the expansion of industrial development in the subdivision, located west of Middlebelt.
 If the lots were to remain zoned industrial as they were designated in the zoning map, Township Attorney Terry Brennan pointed out, "It would be most difficult to turn down future rezoning requests for industrial."
 Adding that it was the "ultimate aim" to have the property become residential, Brennan contended that this would be the most logical use of the land.
 "For a planner to recommend against such rezoning would be incredible," Brennan argued. "The existing industrial lots are isolated. They are completely surrounded by residential zoning."
 Under the new zoning, existing industries would be permitted to continue normal operations although considered as "non-conforming uses." However, expansion or conversion to another type of industrial use would be restricted under provisions of the township's zoning ordinance governing use of residential zones.
 Although the provisions would prohibit expansion of present facilities on neighboring lots as well as preventing what is considered a "more obnoxious" use of the land, the restrictions Brennan insisted, "are not really that tough."
 Brennan's comments were directed towards owners of three lots involved in particular the D'Angelo Brothers who operate a plumbing business on lots 52 and 53.
 The brothers, who recently purchased the land, argued that the best use of the land along Middlebelt would be for light industry and commercial use since four industrial lots already exist.
 Clark Floyd A. Cairns replied, "This is precisely why we want this rezoned, to protect the rest of the area from becoming industrial."

Scrutinize Trailer Ordinance

Farmington Township Planners will conduct a public hearing Thursday, April 27, on a proposed ordinance which will govern the expansion of trailer courts.
 The meeting, which will begin at 8 p.m., will be held at the O. E. Dunckel Junior High School on 12 Mile Rd. just east of Farmington Rd.
 Township Clerk Floyd Cairns explained that the ordinance, if adopted, will set up some standards which the Township does not have under the current ordinance. Included in the proposal are regulations about lot sizes, population density, setbacks, parking spaces and roads.
 In other action the Planners will:
 • Examine the final plan for the Independence Community Subdivision;
 • Hear a site plan presentation for a proposed apartment development at 12 Mile and Powers Rd.; and
 • Continue its discussion of an addition to Township Ordinances of a Planned General Business District.

Troyouts Scheduled
