multiple of a piece of property on the east side of Farmington Rd. just north of 13 Mile.

This land had been zoned for multiples with the idea of locating a funeral home in the existing historic structure on the land. Since no funeral home is currently setting up shop on the property the Planners set the hearing before someone would appear with a proposal for apartments and the matter would be out of its control.

The public hearing will be conducted at the May 25 session of the Commission.

Since the City has agreed to assuming construction costs (50 percent of the property) along the route is unbuild, the Council expressed the hope that snow removal would be undertaken by the school district with its equipment.

The Board decided to commend the City for its action in improving the pedestrian approach to the school. It agreed to cooperate, as much as possible, in discovering a way to do the snow removal job without injury to property with the heavy equipment. Efforts must also be consistent with the scheduling of regular snow-clearing work.
