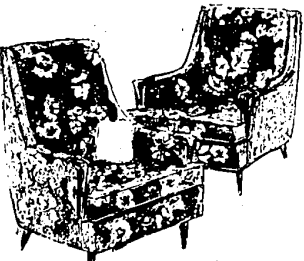

U-D Life Sciences Bldg. New

The \$1.9 million Ford Life Sciences Building, which the Jesuits order dedicated Wednesday, is a new concept in campus construction at the University of Detroit.

The building, made possible by the Ford Motor Company Fund, the Krespe Foundation and thousands of contributors to the U. of D. Challenge Fund, was blessed by the Very Rev. Peter Arrupe, superior general of the Society of Jesus. The Ford Life Sciences Building, designed by Glen Paulsen and Associates, architects, Bloomfield Hills, includes three separate units—a lecture building, greenhouses, and a three-story laboratory building.

The lecture facility, joined to the others by two corridors, thus isolating it from the labs, includes a 275-seat lecture arena, a similar lecture room, and some smaller rooms.

There are none of the familiar permanent demonstration benches in the lecture arenas. They are mounted on wheels and are moved in and out as required.

The laboratory building is an unusual structure on two points according to Paulsen: 1. The general floor layouts are applicable not just to biology, but other sciences, such as physics.

2. The entire unit may be duplicated, as ground space permits, with subsequent buildings joined to the original and each other at utility and stair towers.

The customary rows of long lab benches have been eliminated.

GOP Heads Wag As Conservatives Split Off

Some Republicans—even those sympathetic to the political conservatism of State Sen. Robert Huber—are uncertain what to make of the conservative "Republican Citizens Committee of Oakland County" whose organization was announced Monday.

State Sen. George Kuhn, R-West Bloomfield, thinks much along Huber's line, but he said in a telephone interview he wouldn't join the conservative group.

"I'm not joining any particular political group," said Kuhn, who represents Farmington, Livonia and Plymouth in his district.

But he left no doubt about his sympathies:

"It's regretful that we've had to come to this. It's regretful that the regular party organization hasn't seen fit to make 'peace' between the controlling moderate and the defeated conservative factions."

"I'm never going to take sides in a thing like this. This is cannibalizing."

The rift Kuhn referred to was caused at a 19th District-Oakland County GOP convention in January when conservative Chairman Christian Powell rapped the gavel after a vote in which his forces had elected a slate of state convention delegates by a single vote.

The moderates, led by John Cartwright, carried their protest to the state convention and won easily in a credentials fight.

It was named that Huber has been named chairman of the board of the conservative group. The senator from Troy is the first office-holder of any rank to openly ally himself with the dissatisfied conservative forces in Oakland. Previous spokesmen had been Powell, a township justice of the peace, and Richard Kuhn, brother of the senator and unsuccessful candidate for the GOP congressional nomination in the 19th.

Thomas McMillan, head of the Farmington Township GOP organization, said he fully supports the Republican Committee

of Oakland County, a group Huber specifically attacked.

"It (Huber's conservatives) won't have any adverse effect on the work of the committee. They're like to. It might even spur the Republican Party to better and harder work," McMillan said.

"I don't think the regular organization has made this (split) necessary," he added.

Vice president of the new county conservative group is Mrs. John Schrenk of West Bloomfield Township. She is active in the Powell organization, which set up shop after being defeated at the state convention.

In his prepared statement Monday, Sen. Huber referred to the Powell group by its own chosen title—"the official 19th District Republican Committee." Actually, the GOP State Central Committee recognizes only the Cartwright moderate slate of officers.

Meanwhile, Sen. Kuhn announced that the Vigilance Tax Committee, whose five-year charter expired May 3, has renewed the charter.

Kuhn organized the suburban group when he was mayor of Berkley in order to fight Detroit's income tax on non-residents working in the city.

Kuhn said the group's goals now are (1) to remove cities' power to levy a half-per cent income tax on non-residents and (2) to get a limitation on any state income tax the Legislature may pass.

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
