The \$1 million-plus edifice of Nardin Park Methodist Church on 11 Mile is the fourth building project its minister, the Rev. William Mercer, has undertaken.

He came to Nardin Park from Trinity Methodist in Highland Park where he steered a \$70,000 re-modeling job. He spent 12 years at St. Andrew Methodist, going there when it was a mission church, and oversaw the building of two units at \$100,000 and \$250,000 each.

During his tenure at St. Andrew the church grew to 2,300 members, so the clergyman is accustomed to congregations as large as the 1,700 member Nar-din Park parish.

WHEN THE CHURCH moved out here from Detroit three years ago, Mr. Mercer was assigned to it he says, "to hold the congregation together." It had been accused of raising a race issue when it sold its old church building to Ebenezer African Methodist Church.

The choice of Farmington for its present 20-acre site was made by the Detroit Council of Churches. When the move was made here, 1,300 of the member families remained with it. Four bundred new members have joined since the move. Sunday school membership has tripled to a total of 800. site

To run this church corporation, Mr. Mercer has three assistants--the Rev. Roy Syme, associate; the Rev. Frank Benish, minister of visitation; and Dr. John Phelps, minister of music.

Each makes 15-20 parish calls a day and Mr. Mercer says another full time staff member is badly needed.

Mercer says another un time shar inconcer a badly needed. There are three choirs, a Boy Scout troop, youth groups for all ages, two bowling leagues, three adult Sunday school classes, a Methodist Men's group and a Women's Society of Christian Service.

AS HEAD of all this activity, Mr. Mercer com-ments, "If I couldn't pray, I'd go nuts." Prayer relieves tensions for Mr. Mercer, but for sustained relief from parish problems, he travels the world. He and his wite sell tours and the two of them have covered cities from London to Leningrad.

His church study is filled with conversation pieces he has brought home from far-flung places. Here at home he relaxes by playing squash in the winter, golf in the summer and painling at oils at odd moments in between.

Born in Fresno, Calif., and brought up in the midwest, Mr. Mercer attended Ohio Wesleyan University and Drew Theological Seminary.

He didn't make up his mind to enter Christian service until his senior year in college and says he was a minister for six years before he had a "thorough-going religious experience."

"At this time," he says, "three basic things came to me—a surrender to God, a genuine belief in prayer and a real belief in creative good will toward everybody."

He has taken these basic beliefs and combined them with a conservative concept of world and church affairs.

He says, "I am a conservative. I believe we ought to bring to the pulpit the Christian image in relation to current issues. I feel one of the weak-nesses of the extreme left is that it assumes every-body is psychologically strong.

"Most of the people I know need inspiration to keep body and soul together as well as guidance as to where to apply faith.

"I DON'T FOLLOW the extreme conservative idea of a flaming Hell and personal devil—God to me is a god of love and the whole world pivots upon the individual who has the ability to feel the pres-ence of God in a way unique to him.

About this he says." I know many ministers who have been so caught up in outside issues and meet-ings they are no longer ministering to their congre-gations.

"You just can't play God—you just do your best. I am a great believer in spending most of my energies where I am."
