Livonia Lures \$250,000 Payroll From Detroit

Livonia has lured a new precision tool plant and its \$250,000-a-year payroll from Detroit to a 6,800-square-foot building now under construction at 12283 Levan Road.

Construction started May 1 and the plant is expected to be ready for occupancy late in July.

Beloit Tool Corp. of South Beloit, Ill., with three plants at its home base and others at Los Angeles and Toronto, will move its Detroit operation to Livonia from 22219 Fenkel.

Fred D. Watson, vice president of the company, said the present 28 employees in Detroit helped make the choice to move to Livonia.

"We took a vote and they (the employees) decided Livonia was the most logical place to move," he said. "They are mostly skilled workers."

The company makes precision gage and taps under the brand name of "Beloit." It also makes special precision thread plug and thread ring gages.

"Livonia was our most logical choice because of the convenient geographical location, excellent accessibility on Class 'A' roads and proposed new expressways," Watson said.

"The rapidly rising industrial trend towards Livonia and the exceptional fine operation we received from Dan Andrew and the Industrial Development Commission of Livonia also were factors."

Helps Land Marines

Fireman Apprentice John E. Stevens, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Donald F. Stevens, 9337 Newburgh Road, Livonia, helped to land a fully-equipped force of Marines on the beaches of Camp Pendleton Marine Corps Base in southern California, during a simulated wartime amphibious training exercise.

Watson said that Jack Bales, the present manager of the Detroit plant, will continue as head of the Livonia installation.

He said that because gages must be manufactured to extremely close tolerances, most of the new plant will be air

conditioned and heated with the temperature instantly controlled.

The new plant was designed by Jack Lee, gage architect, and is being constructed by Oakland Builders Inc. of Southfield.

"We need a bigger plant," Watson said. "We needed room for expansion. In Livonia, we have facilities for both."

The Detroit plant was purchased by Beloit in 1963. It was formerly the Empire Gage Co.

Police Squad Authorized by Council

Creation of a misdemeanor or squad in the detective bureau of the Livonia Police Department was authorized by the City Council.

The new squad, with a lieutenant, two corporals and

four patrolmen, will not add new men but convert patrolmen into detectives.

The move brought the transfer of \$48,000 from one account to another to finance the new squad without af-

fecting the overall police budget.

One patrolman, Shirley Garrison, will be promoted to corporal in the change-over.
