

Small Turnout Seen June 12

Out of 36,000 eligible for the June school board election, less than 4,000 will go to the polls if the 1966 turnout is repeated.

Mrs. Willa Parmenter, school board elections clerk, said Monday that she hopes everyone registered to vote will either go to the polls or use the absentee ballot available from her office.

Voters expecting to use the absentee ballot should apply immediately at the school board office at 15123 Farmington Road or call the office at 422-1200. Ballots will be mailed to those voters who can not come to the school board office.

Seven candidates are running for two seats on the Livonia School Board and two candidates are running for the Schoolcraft Board of Trustees.

School board candidates are Ken Morris, 3593 Scone, James W. Fied, 18330 Fremont, Joseph A. Milko, 30921 Wentworth, Robert J. Siegmund, 38525 W. Eight Mile, George L. Kindred, 14357 Ardor, William H. Craft, 31688 Texas, Edwin S. Brown, 34617 Bristol.

Schoolcraft Board of Trustees candidates are Leroy Bennett, 18809 Nola Dr., Paul Mutnick, Weyher, 19922.

"The school district boundaries are the same as the Livonia city limits with one major exception," Mrs. Parmenter said. "Two large sections extend beyond Joy Road into Westland."

The southern boundary of the district includes Lowell and Whittier Junior High Schools and Hayes, Monroe, Cooper and the Cooper Annex Elementary Schools.

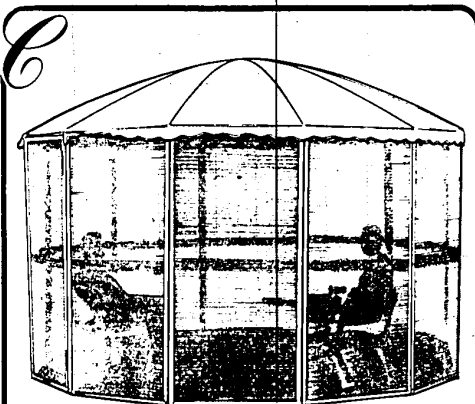

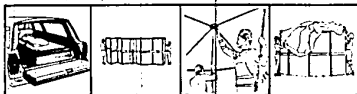

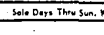
