"The Odd Couple" is a full house of laughter. The current Fisher Theater offering continues in riotous fashion. Neil Simon's superb comic writing.

Combine facial situations, witty lines, and a cast of high professional comic artists and you'll have a million laughs of every size and shape. "The Odd Couple" is such a venture into the realm of risibility.

Phil Foster and George Goebel have taken a momentary hiatus from the TV lanes to cavort live nightly in "The Odd Couple." It is Detroit's gain that Detroiters do some stage work. Their performances are ace-high and win every pot.

The poker player is quite in order since "The Odd Couple" revolves around the universal night out for the boys and their perennial poker game. In this case it is being held in Oscar's apartment, which is happily divorced.

The plot starts slowly and really isn't too important as is the case in most good comedies. "The Odd Couple" is essentially a comedy that is thrown into a most plausible situation.

Oscar has been divorced. Felix is on the verge of divorce. His wife has asked him to leave. Oscar takes him into his apartment. After all, he has eight rooms and what's a pal for?

Little does Oscar realize that Felix is neat as a pin, has different approaches to daily living, and loves to cook. The conflict of Oscar, the slop, and Felix, the highly organized, efficient male provides a solid evening of "belly" laughs. Or as Felix would put it "laughter" that emanates from the visceral region.

The pace of the evening is established immediately in the first act when Oscar serves the inevitable midnight snack. Beer and sandwiches fly through the air in a devastating cascade. The resulting foamy shambles has the audience limp with laughter.

Can such early hilarity be continued? Not only can it be, but in "The Odd Couple" it builds and builds until your sides tingle ache by the middle of Act III. Laughter runs rampant in this two-hour and ten-minute laugh riot. Every line seems to have a chuckle, smile or chorle embedded within its sly contents.
