 Aldo Vagnozzi, chairman of the Farmington Democratic Club, was among those present at the testimonial dinner given for Alf Landgren, an active Democrat for many years and Nelson's political contemporary.

Vagnozzi said that Nelson finished speaking approximately 8:00 Monday evening, sat down and suffered a heart attack. He was dead on arrival at Botsford General Hospital. He had had a history of heart trouble. Recently, Nelson had been in the public limelight for being a highly vocal proponent for the proposed nature trail suggested for the Rouge River banks in Farmington. He was a member of the Planning Commission subcommittee that was conducting a study of the nature trail proposal.

Nelson was also one of the original initiators of the Farmington District Library System plan, and was a founder of the Friends of the Library.

He is survived by his wife, Marion; three sons, Stanford D. of Battle Creek, David S. Ruelle of Farmington, and Howard A. Ruelle of Livonia; one daughter, Mrs. Elena Kirk of Monroe; one brother, Walter M. of Detroit; three sisters, Miss Margaret Nelson of White Pigeon, Mrs. Robert I. (Charlote) Bakema of White Pigeon and Mrs. Florence Snider of Jackson; 18 grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Services will be Thursday at 1 p.m. in the Heehey-Sundquist Funeral Home, Farmington. Dr. W. Leslie Williams of the First Methodist Church of Farmington officiating. Burial will be in Parkview Memorial Cemetery, Livonia.

The increase amounts to \$5,700, quite a bit below what neighboring districts starting salaries are.
