

Best Possible Education Aim Of School Bd.

The best possible education and the fullest development of the child.

That's the aim of Farmington schools.

In 1963 the Farmington Board of Education outlined the philosophy of the schools. Their statement reads:

"The Farmington Public Schools will strive to provide for the fullest development of each student.

"Through the mastery of skills;

"Through the acquisition of knowledge;

"Through the growth of reasoning;

"Through the fostering of acceptable attitudes and appreciation in all areas of the curriculum.

"The curriculum shall be designed to emphasize intellectual development without neglecting the development of manual skills and mental and physical health.

"The fostering of social development shall be considered a secondary goal.

"Within budgetary limitations, each pupil shall be privileged to work to the limit of his capacity by providing sep-

arate ability groupings within grades. Without exerting undue pressure, the teacher shall encourage each pupil to work according to his ability.

"Study assignments, methods of teaching, rates of learning and evaluation of each student's work shall be the joint responsibility of the teaching and administrative staff.

"Examinations, grading and reports are essential, too, so that each student may know his own strengths and weaknesses.

"Guidance and counseling shall be provided by all members of the teaching staff at all levels—elementary and secondary.

"It is the further responsibility of the teacher to present the subject in an interesting and stimulating manner so each student is motivated toward his best performance.

"It is important that students learn to do their tasks thoroughly, to work in a group as well as independently, to be courteous and considerate of others, to be sincere in their attitudes toward work and to understand the importance of assuming responsibility as well as accepting privileges.

"The school will strive to supplement the home, church and community in developing ideals, loyalties and character necessary for effective citizenship in a democratic society."

In keeping with this philosophy the schools offer varied curriculum plus enrichment courses and special services. A well-rounded adult education program is also offered each semester for the benefit of the community.

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Title of Realtor Started After Incident in 1915

The headline of the Minneapolis newspaper that day in 1915 declared "Real Estate Man Swindles a Poor Widow."

Charles N. Chadbourn winced.

He read the story and was relieved to learn that the "real estate man" was a back-room operator. Mr. Chadbourn knew, however, that the action of the man had brought discredit to all real estate men in the city.

He and other members of the Minneapolis Real Estate Board were especially upset because they had been working to elevate the standards by which real estate practitioners did business.

Deciding that the board members needed some sort of designation which would distinguish them from the back-room promoters and other "rascals," Mr. Chadbourn devised the term "Realtor", which the board and later the National Association of Real Estate Boards adopted for use only by members of the Association.

Fifty-two years later, the term is still the property of NAREB, which has 19 court decisions to back up its ownership. The term is registered as a service mark in the U.S. Patent Office under the trademark laws, and, since it is a coined term, it should always be capitalized as are other trademarks and proper nouns.

To be eligible to use the term "Realtor", a real estate practitioner must first become a member of his local board of Realtors and, through the board, a member of NAREB. Although specific entrance requirements vary from board to board, a candidate for membership must show himself to be of good character and knowledgeable in the field of real estate. He must also pledge himself to uphold NAREB's strict Code of Ethics. This is a detailed Code which covers all facets of the real estate profession from responsibilities to buyer and seller, to relationships with other members of the profession.
