Y Offers Three 2-Week Day Camps

Farmington area YMCA will offer three two-week day camp periods at Kenington Park on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday, June 26-July 7, July 10-July 21 and July 24-Aug. 4.

Overnight camps are planned the second Thursday of each period.

Consultations with parents will be held during the week prior to each camp session so that parents may meet counselors, set goals for their children and camp and have questions answered.

Consultation dates are June 20, July 7 and July 18.

Fees are \$32 for the first child in a family and \$30 for the second child in the same camping period.

YMCA membership is required to take part in the program. Cost of an individual child's membership is \$5; family membership is \$15 per year.

Included in the fee is insurance, leadership, program supplies, milk, overnight camping costs and a YMCA T-shirt.

Busses for Kenington will leave from the YMCA on Grand River east of Drake Road at 9 a.m. each morning and will return at 4 p.m., each afternoon. Special bus service will be available for \$4 per family. Pickup will begin at 8 a.m.

It is expansion is any criterion, Barbara Ann Brown has been an executive of a big business during her seven years as trustee on the Farmington Board of Education.

In this period, Mrs. Brown has voted on the building of two junior high schools, a high school, six elementary schools and additions to nine other schools.

And Mrs. Brown says she expects this growth to continue, although she will no longer be a trustee to vote on more expansion.

SHE SAYS, "The growth in the next few years will be more rapid in the secondary schools than the elementary. We're getting the bulk there."

"The figure for increase in the number of school children is almost 1,000 a year. The board has bought the school sites so it is prepared. It has another junior high site, a senior high site and several elementary school sites, although a few more of these will be needed."

Staffing these schools is the next problem, according to the retiring trustee.

"Good teachers are always hard to find. They must be interested in children and young people—always have an open mind, and a good disciplinarian. And a good teacher must know many things in addition to his subject."

Mrs. Brown credits the community for making the local districts' growth possible.

"THERE HAS been building ever since I've been on the board," she notes. "And the community has never turned down a request for money."

The trustee expects Farmington's high status educational standards to continue under the


