## Shows Off Prototype

A star attraction at the recent Greater Michigan Boat Show was a power-or-sail catamaran designed by Farmington's Percy Gardhouse. Called a "strange new boat," it was the most advertised boat in the show.

A retired attorney, Gardhouse designed the boat and built the prototype. He says it is one of the country's fastest sailboats and provides the smoothest ride under either sail or power by employing hydrofoil principles.

Called the Dragonfly, the boat carries 220 feet of sail and will travel in wind up to 35 miles per hour under sail and up to 50 miles per hour under power, according to its inventor. Gardhouse says he has patents covering nine functional claims on the boat and plans to have it manufactured under franchise.

Gardhouse, a resident of Farmington for about 15 years, lives at 25221 Brookview. He was chairman of the Township Zoning Board for several years and is presently a member of the Township Planning Commission. Among other interests he was the originator, and now a director, of the Mt. Brighton Ski area.

## Salmonella Germs A Danger

So-called food poisoning germs come in various sizes and strengths. Some are very weak and some are very strong—even deadly.

The salmonella family of germs represents a family of food poisoning organisms which fall generally into the middle of this intensity range.

Public health and agricultural experts are seeing to the safety of these products for you, right up to your grocer's shelf, and now control measures at all levels of processing and distribution are being introduced to prevent the survival and spread of these germs. But you also have a job at home: to control the possibility of salmonella with good personal hygiene and modern sanitation.

Always wash your hands before preparing food and use only thoroughly clean utensils. . . never use the same ones for cooked food as for uncooked. Keep perishable food under refrigeration, and subject all hot foods to a high enough temperature in cooking (140 degrees) to kill any salmonella germs.
