Tablet is Among Fruits of 1899 Baby-Ionian Expedition Preserved at University of Pennsylvania-New Proof of the Deluge.

Philadelphia.—Prof. Herman V. Hilprecht of the Department of Archeology of the University of Pennsylvaniahas found among the tablest from the
"Temple Library" of Nippur, a remarkable fragment containing a potion of the "Babylonian Deluge Story,"
"this being, he says, the oldest extant
reference to that event in writing, antedaying the Bible narrative of the deluge by at least 1,000. The first announcement of this discovery was
made by Prof. Hilprecht at the Acorn
Club, when he gave a full account of
the tablet and its translation and discussed its bearing on the other known cussed its bearing on the other known cuneiform and other inscriptions referring to the deluge.
