Was Forgotten at Time of Berlin Treaty, but Now Has Regular Place in the World.

It has just become known that the little island of Ada Kaleh, situated in the river Danube near the Iron Gate of Orsova, has been formally

Persian Families Have Private Designs, and No Two Are Alike.

A Persian never walks or stands upon a carpet in his shoes. In Per-sian carpets are held in great venera-tion; often they will remain in the tion; often they will remain in the family for generations, such careful treatment do they receive. When the owner of a valuable carpet dies he very often gives instructions that it shall be cut up in pieces as heirshall be cut up in pieces as heir soms to his successors, and should a member of the family not receive a portion he would feel very greatly

have been handed down from remote ages. Each family keeps its own dosign, no two carpets being alike for fear of the evil eye. The wool of which the Perulan carpet is made is taken from the lustrous wool of a special heed of skeep or from the goat, which is dyed by means of certain plants and strubs. It would be a criminal offense for persons to warve a carpet according to a European design, for a law has been made by the shah especially forbidding this.
