ISLAND GIVEN TO HUNGARY

Was Forgotten at Time of Berlin Treaty, but Now Has Regular Place in the World.

It has just become known that the little island of Ada Kaleh, situated in the river Danube near the Iron Gate of Orsova, has been formally annexed by Hungary.

Ever since the year 1878 the island has been virtually in Hungarian hands, as since 1870 a garrison has always held the place. It is a picturesque island, with about 2,000 Turkish inhabitants, and was "forgotten" at the time of the Berlin treaty.

The formal annexation was accomplished when a prefect and two Hungarian officers from Orsova arrived at the island and in spite of the protest of the Turkish governor declared it to be annexed by Hungary.

The annexation was carried out in view of the Balkan peace preliminaries, which handed over to the Balkan allies all the Turkish possessions west of the Enos Midia line. The smallness of the island made it inexpedient to insert a special clause in the draft peace treaty. There is no reason to fear that its formal annexation will raise international difficulties.
