

Co-ordinators Teach Sex Education Class at Merrill-Palmer

Enthusiasm among pioneers is contagious. Original instructors of the sex education program in Farmington, Dr. Jack Cleveland and Larry Freedman, will pass on their know-how to teachers from the entire metropolitan area at a Merrill-Palmer Institute workshop this summer.

More than a dozen teachers from Farmington will attend in preparation for the expansion of the local program to six groups when adult education classes begin here in the fall.

In view of parent response observed thus far, Freedman predicts that each elementary school will be hosting a similar class by the end of next year.

Appointed by Superintendent Gerald V. Harrison, as co-ordinator to supervise the program's continuation and expansion after his own retirement, Freedman and Cleveland are quick to assign to Harrison all credit for the program's inception.

According to Cleveland, "Mr. Harrison saw the great need for a more comprehensive approach to sex education. We were all totally dissatisfied with the job being done."

"HE SUGGESTED that the program be first directed toward the adults until community reaction might be evaluated. This was really a great

step for an administrator to take in this unexplored area."

Mrs. William Stevens, 23215 Montclair Dr., a parent who attended one of the original classes, is now definitely in favor of incorporating sex education into the curriculum.

Walter Jablonski, Longacre principal, who also attended, will now prepare himself at the summer workshop for teaching such a course himself.

"It offered a valuable opportunity for parents to express themselves after the initial reserve was overcome," said Jablonski. "It certainly is in favor of expanding the program."

Mrs. Virginia Stedman, a secretary at Middlebelt School, considered the course very fine and informative. "Most adults could benefit from it," she commented, "though I did feel we needed a few more sessions."

Mrs. Esther Greenfield, a third grade teacher at Middlebelt, remarked, "The classes are tremendously good. They help adults to express themselves on an important subject. They also make parents aware of community problems. More adults should become involved in these courses."

Mrs. Martin Mendelson of 22538 Glenmore Heights Dr. announced that she plans to take the course over and over again. "It's almost like free counseling," she observed. "While there was some hesitation at first, it is a good idea to discuss our common problems."

IN THEIR OWN evaluation of progress to date, Cleveland, who is principal at Kenbrook School and Freedman, who holds the same post at Highmeadow, both agreed that with the excellent help provided by films made available by a McGregor Fund grant, small group discussions were extremely valuable to all.

Role playing was another significant success. Class members are confronted with typical questions raised by children concerning sex, and they have a chance to search for the best response.

"Here," said Freedman, "the instructor must learn to listen and stand aside. Our objective, after all, is to have the parents assess their own attitudes and values."

IN THIS WAY, both he and Cleveland assert, parents will be better equipped to give their children proper guidance. They must ultimately help the younger generation to face life and the pressures of society with the proper perspective.

Anyone can find a set of answers in a handy paperback edition, both educators maintain. To build a basic understanding and feeling for fellow human beings is another matter, however, they point out.

This is precisely what the sex education program hopes to accomplish. Parents are invited to contact their children's school principals to discuss these efforts and make suggestions for enlarging them.
