It's a lucky man whose wife loves to cook. Mrs. Brotherton also loves to cook.

In this instance, she's the lucky one. She loves to cook, but doesn't love to eat, so she weighs an infinitesimal 89 pounds, which isn't much for her five-foot five height.

She is so interested in cooking that she once asked Farmington Librarian Mildred Droege to order a book on Chinese, Hawaiian and Japanese cuisine. Her husband loves oriental sweet and sour pork. It also might be said that it's a lucky man whose wife is willing to move all over the country when he's transferred in his job.

Especially since she moved from Oak Park, Ill., to Fort Wayne, Ind., to Peru, Ind., to Chicago when she was growing up.

After marrying Brotherton in Chicago, the couple lived in New York, Ind., Syracuse, N.Y., back Chicago, Niles, Ill., Detroit and finally Farmington.

## Mrs. Brotherton's 'Sing-Along' Meal

Here is a recipe for spaghetti which Mrs. Wilbur V. Brotherton, wife of the mayor, kept a secret until Our Lady of Sorrows talked her into putting into a church cookbook. She calls it:

Mitch Miller's Spaghetti Recipe  
1/2 cup minced onions  
1/4 cup salad oil  
1/2 lb. ground beef  
2 cloves of garlic minced (she uses one)  
6 ounce can of mushrooms (save the liquid)  
1 egg, one can of tomato sauce  
1 No. 2 can of tomatoes strained  
2 1/2 teas. salt  
1/2 teas. pepper  
1/4 teas. sugar  
Small pinch of fresh or dried thyme  
1 cup of burgundy or other red wine

Directions: Simmer onion in oil for five minutes. Add beef and garlic and cook until brown. Add mushrooms and liquid and tomato sauce. Strain canned tomatoes and add to mixture. Add salt, pepper, sugar, thyme. Cover and simmer for one hour. Add wine, cover and simmer another hour. Twenty minutes before serving time, cook one pound of spaghetti, add sauce and one cup diced sharp Cheddar cheese.

Registration for Our Lady of Mercy High School summer school will be held from 9 to 11 a.m. and 1 to 3 p.m. June 22 and 23 at the school, 26300 11 Mile Road.

Regular classes will be held from 9 a.m. to noon from Monday, June 26, through Friday, July 28. There will be a holiday break July 3 and 4.

Classes are offered to boys and girls grades seven to 12. Students must provide their own transportation. Fees are \$20 for each subject, with the fee for art at \$30. SUBJECTS offered for credit on student's record are: Remedial English; English I, 2, 3, and 4; orientation to new math I, Latin I and II, French I and II, world history, American history, American government (civilics and economics), typewriting I, art, swimming and drama workshop.

Art classes will cover experiences in drawing and painting. Those interested in experimenting with a variety of media. Class periods will be augmented with a comparative study of primitive and modern masters through slide lectures. All materials are included in the fee. An exhibit and reception for art students will be given sometime in July.

The school will offer a developmental reading course July 18-Aug. 4. It will enable students to improve grades, achieve better comprehension, increase reading speed and learn sensible study habits. Fee is \$25.
