

Trinity Church Lives Up To Its Motto

Although their church is tucked back in the woods on 11 Mile Rd., members of Trinity Episcopal Church are very much at home in today's socio-economic traffic.

Directed by their pastor, the Rev. Joseph A. Pelham, they are striving to prove that a parish church can be an instrument of action for the betterment of the world.

Mr. Pelham says this is one of the real questions facing the whole church today -- "How do you translate talk into action?"

HE CONCEDES, "Many people say the ministry of a parish church deals mainly with the family."

But he disagrees.

At Trinity they use a phrase to describe the function of the parish -- "It is a worship and training center to prepare Christians for their tasks in the world."

The parish has translated this phrase into action with diverse programs.

Last year, women of the church studied the role of women in today's society. The men had a discussion group focusing on issues they face in their daily work.

Also last year, there was a parish-wide program called

"New Frontiers of Christian Mission" called to study frontiers of faith in the Christian world.

WIFE HE guides his congregation in these directions. Mrs. Pelham is aware that not all clergymen go along with him.

"There is a real possibility the church will be seriously divided," he notes.

"The most serious division is not the division between denominations, but between those who want the church to become relevant and those who take what I might call a pietistic position."

"It seems the church is attempting to effect a new reformation -- we're groping toward this and yet have to discover ways in which it can be accomplished."

"This is due in part to a strong element in the church which does not want it relevant to life."

"I THINK, however, this is a time in which the church is attempting to discover ways to reach people and effect changes. But we have yet to find an effective way of doing this."

Mr. Pelham seems to have given these matters some serious thought during his just-completed four-month fellowship at Episcopal Theological
