

Building Up In Livonia By \$15 Million

The building industry isn't idle in Livonia.

The month of May report showed that permits were issued by the Department of Public Works' Bureau of Inspection for construction costing \$2,329,497.

That brings the six-month total, since December 1, 1966 to \$15,748,735, Chief Inspector Frank A. Kerby said. Bureau fees for the period were \$112,073.74.

Residential permits for the month numbered 106, increasing the half-year figure to 331, costing \$8,332,571. The month's permits called for expenditure of \$2,521,203.

Twelve commercial and industrial permits proposed buildings costing \$918,000 and brought the six-month total to 49 and \$3,220,732. Eleven additions, for a total of 50, list at \$73,295 and a period total of \$1,080,633.

The report lists a dozen new pools, costing \$24,600 for a six-month total of 25 and \$50,800.

Sixty-six garage and accessory permits call for an outlay of \$122,841, for a period total of 170 and \$322,239. Addition and alterations totaling 94 and 284, costing \$112,354 and \$414,151.

There was one church permit for \$58,317, the 10th since Dec. 1, totaling \$1,256,755.

While the building was being authorized, the bureau collected \$30 for permits to demolish six buildings. Permits in the previous five months authorized destruction of 18. There also was authority to move three buildings, and certificates of occupancy for May numbered 68, with the half-year total 283.
