

## Golf Widows Take to The Links

The voice of the golf widow is being heard in the land.

That season is here again. But there aren't so many golf widows anymore. The little woman has taken to the game like Arnold Palmer takes to Arnie's Army.

And she's not out on the greens alone. Retirees, white collar workers, kids—all shapes and sizes of people have taken up the game.

Golfers from this area can be found playing at Farmington Country Club or the course at Independence Green Apartments or San Marino Country Club or Glen Oaks Country Club or practicing at the All Star Golf Range on Grand River.

Pros at these places say business is wonderful. Norm Potts, manager at Independence Green, says the course at the develop-

ment could handle more players, especially in the daytime—which is a switch.

A short 18 holes, with par 5s, the Independence Green course is still a good test of golfing skill. Women like it because it's not too tricky to play.

Preston Meisel, pro at Farmington Country Club, says warm weather has brought players out in good number. The junior program is now open and more young people will be out when school's out.

Meisel says the club's greens are better than ever because they were aerified this year. This means that pesticides plugs of earth were taken out to soften them.

The club also has two women's leagues and tournaments each weekend during the summer for men. There is a Preston Meisel tournament for the women. Farmington Country Club is an 18 hole course with a par of 72.

Glen Oaks' pro, Sten Jawor, says play on the course has been heavy. The course is booked solid on weekends, but reservations can be made.

Although a public club, Glen Oaks' course is in as good condition as a private club, according to Jawor. An 18 hole course, it has a par of 69.

Jawor's brother, John is a pro at San Marino. This is a nine hole course with a par of 36.

Mrs. Margaret King, wife of the owner at the All Star Range, attributes the increasing interest in golf to the great exposure it is being given in newspapers and on television.

Women play, she thinks, because it provides an escape from the housewife routine.

## UF Names Regional Chairman

Mrs. Craig J. Rockafellow, of 23819 Wilmarth, Farmington has been named residential chairman of Region 44 in the 1967 Torch Drive.

Region 44 includes the townships of Farmington, Nott, Ligon and Commerce. Mrs. Rockafellow's appointment to the campaign post was announced this week by Mrs. Francis H. Valler, of Southfield, Oakland County residential chairman.

"I am pleased that Mrs. Rockafellow has accepted this important Torch Drive position," Mrs. Valler said. "She is experienced, enthusiastic and dedicated."

The new chairman for Region 44 began working for the United Foundation in 1962 "because I believe in united giving."

She was a doorbell ringer in two campaigns before moving up to district chairman, the post she held for two years prior to becoming a division chairman in the 1966 drive.

In addition to her Torch Drive work, Mrs. Rockafellow is active with the University of Michigan Faculty Women's Club and the Farmington Jaycees Auxiliary.

As region chairman, she will be responsible for training and supervising volunteers for this fall's campaign, scheduled Oct. 17 through Nov. 9.

The goal for the 23-day "Give Once for All" campaign has not been set.

Last year's record-breaking Torch Drive raised \$27,492,355 for 32 child care services, 25 health research centers, 54 health and medical services, 32 services for the aging, 68 youth and character-building services, and 44 services for troubled families.

Notice is hereby given that all noxious weeds growing on any land in the City of Farmington, County of Oakland, must be cut down and destroyed on or before the 1st day of July, 1967 and before the 1st day of September, 1967. All weeds must be cut twice every year.

Failure to comply with this notice on or before the date mentioned or within ten days thereafter shall make the parties so failing liable for the costs of cutting same, and an additional levy of ten per centum of such cost, to be levied and collected against the property in the same manner as other taxes are levied and collected. Violators will also be subject to a fine and court costs, chapter 1, section 1.12.

This notice is in compliance with Farmington City code chapter 88, sections 9.81, 9.82 and 9.83.
