

Launch New Program for Nurse Care

A new nursing care program to allow registered nurses to do more actual bedside nursing care and to free them from administrative work has started at Metropolitan Hospital in Detroit.

"It is a return to the old fashioned way of nursing. The registered nurse in our program will have the time to give bedside care," said Mrs. Ursula Somers, Director of Nurses at Metropolitan Hospital.

The program is different in that it reverses a national trend in nursing which has resulted in giving the registered nurse more and more administrative responsibilities instead of actual direct patient care at the bedside.

Since the end of World War II, the approach taken to answering the nursing shortage has only succeeded in removing the trained registered nurse further from the bedside, and placing her in charge of personnel who have restricted skills in the type of service which they can give the patient.

Under the new program, the registered nurse is directly responsible for a small number of hospitalized patients. The Nurse Clinician, an R.N. with a B.S. degree in nursing, supervises staff nurses and auxiliary personnel. Practical nurses, nursing aides, orderlies and others will still assist the nurse, but not beyond their training and capacity.

The hospital tried a pilot project before starting the program, and found the registered nurse had more time with the patients. This resulted in improved patient satisfaction because the professional nurse could readily give many assurances to the patient who was concerned about his illness.

Dr. Caldwell B. Esselstun, executive director of the Community Health Association, a prepayment group health plan whose 77,000 members receive care under an agreement with Metropolitan Hospital and Clinics, said this program could have an important impact on the health field.

"We at CHA believe this to be a real challenge in the health field which has been seeking ways for a long time to improve patient care. We are particularly pleased with the support shown by some of the leaders in the nursing profession in undertaking this pioneering program."

Capsule Sermon

For A Time Like That

(Miss Alston represents the American Bible Society in Michigan, and is president of the United States Women of Ligon. The following is the opening portion of the address she gave before the convention of American Bible Society. The Observer Newspaper Group welcomes other contributions from ministers and lay leaders for its "Capsule Sermon" corner.)

I ask you, what kind of a day and age would you say this is?

"God's Word for a New Age" is the theme of the American Bible Society; but what kind of an age is this? We have had, in the world's history, many ages: primitive ages, the Hellenic age, the Roman, the Middle ages, the Dark ages, the Renaissance, the Age of Reason, and others; and now, what do they call it? The Atomic Age. Some say: the age of restlessness, the age of moral degradation, the age of rebellion.

What would you call it in an age when the owner of a Las Vegas gambling joint says his girls who deal for black jack must do it now stripped to the waist. His regulars balked, so he hired new girls who were willing to do it. And what does the Nevada state commission say? One member said, "I think that's going pretty far."

Another said, "That's downright lewd." But they hadn't, at last report, done anything about it.

And how about the look of pornography in our drug stores, covers of magazines in confectioneries—where children congregate? This is indeed a tragic, confused, and lawless age—when you look in this direction.

But we who are Christians know that the answer is in the Book. We can choose to live like the family of Cain—living away from God—or walk with God, as did Enoch; or dare to be a Noah, and do all that the Lord commands; or an Esther: "Who can tell but that thou art come unto the kingdom for such a time as this?"

Family Life Classes Need More Info on Parent Role

More emphasis on the parental role in marriage is needed in high school and family life courses, says Mrs. Margaret L. Duvall, extension family life and child development specialist of The Pennsylvania State University.

In our society, girls are somewhat better prepared for parenthood than boys. Playing with dolls can be preparation for "motherhood." Girls get instruction and practice in baby-sitting.

However, boys are not so well educated for "fatherhood." Having a baby is a dual responsibility with the father playing a necessary economic and psychological part.

In a recent study at a Mid-western university, sociologists found that 80 per cent of the couples interviewed reported "extensive" or "severe" crisis in adjusting to their first child.

This reaction was not the result of not wanting children. Instead, the couples felt they had little, if any, effective preparation for parental roles. Mrs. Duvall points out.

Most of these husbands and wives were average or above in personality development. Most of the couples rated
