Frederick Studies In Mexico City

Douglas Frederick, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Frederick, 3601 Hillman Valley Dr., Farmington, is enrolled this summer at the University of the Americas in Mexico City, the fifth largest city in the world. Because the over 2,000 students at UA are not only from the United States but from more than 40 other countries, the school plays a distinctive role in intercultural and international education. Accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, the university has a larger enrollment of American students than any other school abroad.

Classes are taught in English by an internationally trained faculty but practically all students learn Spanish not only in the classroom but through their association with the people of Mexico. Most of them live in college-approved private Mexican homes and as a result become familiar with the customs and daily lives of their hosts. Frederick previously attended St. Louis University. He is majoring in Spanish.

Two Livonia girls will study art on the spot in Paris, Florence, and Rome.

The Mayville sisters, 17-year-old Patricia and 16-year-old Barbara, of 36085 Roycroft, will leave July 18 for a six-week art history tour of Europe.

The tour is one of many sponsored by the Foreign Language League Schools, Inc., a non-profit, non-denominational group based in Salt Lake City. According to its brochure:

"The primary goal of the League Schools is to provide American high school students with an opportunity to gain an understanding of Europe and its people through living and studying in the European environment."

The sisters' interest developed through their Stevenson High School English teacher, Mrs. Sharon Chapple, who had been a counselor in the League program. They obtained a necessary recommendation from their art teacher, Mr. Seymour Levine.

Some of Europe's greatest works of art and architecture will be viewed in field trips. Museums to be seen include the Louvre in Paris, the Uffizi in Florence, and the Sistine Chapel of the Vatican in Rome.

Important French architecture will be Versailles, the cathedrals of Chartres and Notre Dame and the Palace of Fontainebleau. In Italy, the girls will see the Pantheon, Colosseum, St. Peter's Basilica, Florence cathedral, and Renaissance palaces.

Legion To Convene In Lansing

A down-to-the-warehouse race for the top office in The American Legion of Michigan will culminate during the 49th Annual Convention of the Legion July 20-23 at Grand Rapids. Three thousand members of the Legion and Auxiliary are expected to attend this important conference.

Contenders in the campaign for State Commander of the Legion are Miles S. Ansbauh of Reading and Wayne E. Squire of Trenton. Ansbauh, retired postmaster of Reading, is a World War I veteran while Squire saw service in World War II and is a senior supervisor in production control with the Ford Motor Company.

One of the highlights of the convention will be the Friday night arrival of John E. Davis, National Commander of the American Legion and a former governor of North Dakota. He will go immediately to a combined press conference and reception for Vietnam veterans who have joined the Legion since eligibility was opened to them at the National Convention in Washington, D.C., last September. Saturday morning Davis will address the delegates at a general convention session.
